JEHOVAH WITNESSES: PRINTING PLANT & PAPER STOCK AT 7 BERESFORD ROAD, STRATHFIELD.

Plant and stock at the above address has been taken over by and is under the control of the Commonwealth Investigation Branch of the Attorney-General's Dept.

2. Application is now therefore made by this Headquarters for the use of the existing premises, plant and stock as it stands as an urgent military necessity.

3. For your information it is explained that the existing printing works at Victoria Barracks cannot possibly cope with all Army needs and in addition the State Government Printer is endeavouring to supply extra demands but is unable to completely satisfy the urgent and regular calls for assistance in this respect.

4. As a branch of the Barracks Printing Works - this plant would be of invaluable assistance in helping to produce Army Forms in large quantities and at rush periods when time is a vital factor. It would, in addition, provide an immediate "going concern" should any damage or serious holdup occur to the present plant at the Barracks owing to enemy action. It is approximately 7 miles due west from Victoria Barracks.

5. Its control and supervision by the Dept. of the Army would obviate certain further public expense which is contemplated in the near future - in regard to the purchase of another guillotine and possible urgently required additions to existing works.

6. A preliminary inspection arranged through the courtesy of Mr. D.A. Alexander was carried out on the 17th June by the Stationery Officer of this Area - Major J.G. Patterson - accompanied by Major D.A. Hames (A/D.P.S.S. from Melbourne) and conducted by Mr. J.R. Magnusson of the Commonwealth Investigation Branch. These Officers report that the premises, plant and stock are all admirably suited for Army requirements and with very little time and expense could be cleaned up and the plant profitably employed in producing urgent requirements.

7. The plant referred to comprises of:-

- 1 Michle 30 x 40 Ptg. Machine.
- 1 " Vertical " "
- 1 Platen " "
- 1 42" Summit Guillotine.
- 1 Wire Stitching Machine.
- 1 Perforator.
- 1 Linotype Machine.

(Several tons of assorted paper - all most useful).

8. The address is already under Army control as all the surrounding buildings are now occupied by a Supply Coy. which provides permanent guards.

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES - Property.

Major J. G. Paterson, Stationery Officer, N.S.W. Lines of Communications Area, in the course of an extensive search for printing plant and stock, yesterday applied at this Office to inspect the plant and stock at 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield, and, subsequently made the inspection accompanied by an Officer of this Branch.

Major Paterson said that all the plant and stock at Strathfield is eminently suitable and urgently required for Defence purposes. Seeing that the Strathfield premises are occupied by the Army, he said that the plant could best be operated in its present location; in this way it would provide a secondary plant should the Printing Works at Victoria Barracks be damaged by enemy action. It is understood that the matter will be taken up with the Secretary, Attorney-General's Department, by the General Officer Commanding, N.S.W. Lines of Communications Area, direct without delay.

Of the property remaining on our hands the motor vehicles and the boats would also improve with use. All the motor vehicles have been taken into storage by the Postmaster General's Department. This Department is in urgent need of certain types of vehicles and the time is opportune for the Commonwealth to allow that Department to use such of the vehicles as they desire.

The boats, as you are aware, are moored at Halvorsens and subject to rental charges. At the present time the ketch is due for slipping and cleaning. The Navy needs these boats for harbour patrol purposes. I suggest that their immediate transfer be authorised.

The work of the officers of your Branch in this matter is greatly appreciated.



JOHNSON'S INTERVIEW.

Further to my memorandum of 23rd May, 1942, I have to advise that the work of removing the contents from the General Office and Nos. 2 and 3 Sheds was completed on 26th May, 1942. The position now is that all literature in cartons (weighing approximately 150 tons) and all folding chairs are stored in a Ministry of Munitions Store (old Sunshine Bakery) at Balmain.

The greater part of the remaining assets, comprising all manner of articles and the records of the now unlawful organisation, are stored under lock and key in the Printery (No. 1 Shed). Due to lack of space, it was found necessary to store large flat bales and rolls of newsprint in the small shed which previously housed gramophone parts; this is under Military Guard.

The work of removal proved an arduous undertaking, involving Officers of this Branch in long hours of supervising and directing the operations. I might also add that the efforts of this Branch were warmly appreciated by the Army Authorities.

The following is copy of a report received from Sydney,
and is forwarded for your information :-

" JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES.

Following an inspection of the premises 7, Beresford Road, Strathfield yesterday by Captain Bray and Lieutenant Sigmont, accompanied by an officer from this Branch, a further inspection was made to-day (28th April) by Lieutenant Colonel Kennedy, Assistant Director of Supply and Transport, Eastern Command.

The Military authorities desire new quarters for 5 Supply Personnel Company which is at present at Marrickville in premises which have been condemned for health reasons. This unit is about 200 strong, and has an Accountancy section; it supplies various Sydney camps and carries 14 days' supply in reserve.

The military officers mentioned were unanimous that the premises are most suitable. It is expected that an immediate move will be made on their part to acquire the premises, together with portion of Jacketts Flour Mill which adjoins.

It is understood that, in addition to the premises, the Army will want the office equipment and most furniture and, perhaps, various other articles (such as laundry equipment). Lieutenant Colonel Kennedy suggests that the Army should take over everything, and that he as A.D.S.T. would dispose of it to best advantage, and it is believed he will submit such a proposition. He will communicate with the Secretary, Attorney-General's Department."

JENOVAH'S WITNESSES - 7 BERESFORD ROAD -
DISPOSAL OF PROPERTY.

I refer to your minute dated 12th May, 1942, forwarding memorandum from the Acting Inspector, Sydney, regarding the above matter.

Whilst it is desired to facilitate as far as possible the occupancy of the premises by the Department of the Army, it must be understood that the military authorities required the use of the premises only. In order to use the premises, it will, of course, be necessary for action to be taken to remove the contents of certain buildings on the premises to some other place for safe keeping.

The Acting Inspector's recommendations in the matter appear to have been based on the assumption that the High Court proceedings have been concluded and that the Commonwealth was successful in the matter. The proceedings have been adjourned until a date to be fixed and it is not desired to take any action with regard to the property on the premises that may prejudice the Commonwealth's case while the matter is sub judice.

I have accordingly instructed the Deputy Crown Solicitor to obtain counsel's advice as to whether any of the property on the premises may be sold or otherwise disposed of.

Meanwhile, there is no objection to the removal, under supervision to a place of security, of the contents of the General Office, No. 2 Shed and No. 3 Shed and I have informed the Deputy Crown Solicitor accordingly.

As stated previously, the Department of the Army has served notice on Mr. McGillivray that it requires the use of the premises, but no mention was made of the contents thereof. The military authorities cannot accordingly, under that requirement, take over and use the domestic equipment, furniture, motor cars, etc.

Regarding the printery, I attach hereto an inventory made by Edwards Dunlop and Co. Ltd. as at 29th July last. This inventory was obtained as the result of inquiries made by the Import Licensing Branch of the Department of Trade and Customs, which is interested in the disposal of the printing machinery etc.

In view of the valuable nature of the printing plant, it might be possible to arrange with the Army authorities to leave the printery intact and not take over the building.

Mention is made in the Acting Inspector's report of three Hudson Sedan cars, but there are in addition on the premises three other cars and a Fargo van.

Mr. McGillivray offered to place these vehicles and the "Light-bearer" and "Lightray" at the disposal of either the State or Commonwealth authorities, but would prefer to leave them in the hands of the Police.

Pending a decision as to their disposal, there would be no objection to the six motor vehicles being garaged in the Postmaster-General's Garage and I shall be glad if you will make arrangements accordingly.

With regard to the contents of the Small Shed referred to in the Acting Inspector's memorandum and containing gramophone parts and benches, these may also be removed under supervision to a place of safe custody.

As soon as advice is received from counsel as to the proper action to be taken with regard to the domestic equipment, furniture in the "Theocratic Embassy" itself and the contents of the printery, you will be further advised.

Dear Sir,

I desire to inform you that the use of the premises known as 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield, is required for the Department of the Army for purposes connected with the prosecution of the war.

The Department of the Army is aware that certain questions are now pending in the High Court of Australia affecting the validity of an order made by the Governor-General on 17th January, 1941, whereby the body known as Jehovah's Witnesses and other bodies became unlawful bodies under the National Security (Subversive Associations) Regulations.

The requirement of the use of the above premises for the purposes of the Department of the Army is not related in any way to the questions pending in the High Court and, if it had not been for the fact of the above order, the premises would have been requisitioned by the Department in the ordinary course.

The Department of the Army therefore calls upon you and all others who are permitted to use the premises to vacate the same and requires any person desiring to enter upon the premises to refrain from doing so unless authorised to do so by that Department.

I am in receipt of an order addressed to Mr. Alexander MacGillivray, the Attorney of the above Association and of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society and have to reply:-

Apart from the validity of the order, which question will be decided by our solicitors, I would advise that there are at least fifty people sleeping on the premises. While we have no desire to stand in the way of the Military, you will appreciate I am sure that it is impossible for fifty people to find accommodation in Sydney at such short notice, especially at this time.

Arrangements are being made to go in a few days' time when we hope suitable accommodation will be found. I am instructed by Mr. MacGillivray to ask for further time in which to vacate.

Attorney General that he direct, under the National Security (Subversive Associations) Regulations that with respect to this property seized under those Regulations and at present on the premises known as 7 Beresford Road:-

- a. That all articles of domestic equipment and furniture; articles of office equipment nature; and all motor vehicles be handed over to the Department of the Army or the P.M.G.'s Department for use by those Departments.

Prior to the handing over of the good referred to in this paragraph, an inventory thereof be made and the goods valued as at the time of handing over.

- b. That all articles made of paper in the nature of books, pamphlets and other publications be removed from the premises and stored in a place of security.
- c. That all office records, e.g. invoices, ledgers, ledger cards and business systems, be removed from the premises and stored in a place of security.
- d. That the printery, all equipment and parts relating thereto and all bulk paper be handed over to the Department of the Army - a proper inventory thereof being taken and a valuation of such goods being made. Such paper as is of no use to the Department of the Army to be handed over to the Commonwealth Stores Depot.
- e. In respect of the goods referred to in (a) and (d), to the extent to which such goods are not required by the Department of the Army, the Postmaster-General's Department or any other Commonwealth Department, the articles be sold to the best advantage. (Note: It is not anticipated that any goods will be included in this category).

It is further recommended that the Attorney General make a similar direction under the same Regulations directing the disposal of the boats seized under those Regulations to the Department of the Navy or the Commissioner of Police.

I am informed that transport and personnel required to make the necessary removals can be provided by the Department of the Army; such personnel would, of course, work under the supervision of Officers of the Commonwealth Investigation Branch. Similarly, the preparation of inventories can be carried out by personnel provided by the Department of the Army directed by the Commonwealth Investigation Branch.

It is anticipated that a store will be secured from the Division of Import Procurement, i.e., a section of one of their stores will be used, such store being under Commonwealth Peace Officer protection.

The foregoing proposals have been submitted to the Deputy Crown Solicitor, Sydney, who is in complete accordance with same.

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES - Disposal of Property.

As already advised, the Fifth Supply Personnel Company entered into occupancy of the premises known as 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield on Sunday, 10th May, 1942. An advance party is now at work preparing for the reception of the main body. The Army authorities desire, in order to minimise dislocation, that the main body of troops enter the premises as soon as possible.

I am already being pressed to facilitate clearing the property of the seized matter stored in four sheds in the grounds, that part of the residence formerly used as the general office of the now dissolved International Bible Students' Association, and the garage, so that the work of the Military advance party be not delayed.

The following will give some indication of the nature of the stores and the contents thereof:-

General Office: Measurement approximately 20' x 60' and part of the main residence. It contains an iron safe, a number of office desks and filing cabinets, typewriters, and voluminous official records and documents of the former Jehovah's Witnesses' Organisations.

No. 1 Shed (Printery): Brick with galvanised iron roof, approximately 30' x 80', and formerly used as a Printery, Paper Store and Mailing Office. Contents comprise a large and valuable printing press, linotype machine, guillotine and quantities of all material associated with printing: many tons of newsprint, paper, ink, etc. seized from Rollo Press, Hurstville; electrical goods seized from F. N. Franks' premises; the proceeds of the searches of many private homes and other places, consisting mainly of books, gramophones and gramophone records. The contents of this store are probably worth many thousands of pounds.

No. 2 Shed: Approximately 20' x 60', and formerly used as a literature store. It was practically filled to capacity by its original store of literature, numbering several hundred large cartons of books and gramophone records. The proceeds of a number of searches have since been placed therein.

No. 3 Shed: Approximately the same dimensions as No. 2. This was a store shed practically empty on the occasion of our occupying the premises. Later we stored several hundreds of cartons of books lifted from various Bond Stores therein and three motor cars and a motor van.

Small Shed: Approximately half the size of the abovementioned sheds. It houses large cases of gramophone parts and a number of benches.

Garage: Capacity five cars. It houses three seized Hudson Motor Cars.

for Mr. Rees also to converse by 'phone with the Deputy Crown Solicitor, confirming the new arrangement. I might also add that I informed Mr. MacGillivray that within the next couple of days if there was any article of a private nature still on the premises the facilities to obtain same would be granted.

From my inspection of the premises at 10.45 a.m. on 9th May, 1942, and from my conversation with Mr. MacGillivray, I am of the opinion that the original twenty-four hours' notice given was ample. In a general conversation, Mr. MacGillivray expressed in strong terms his dissatisfaction with the action being taken and indicated that he would not let the matter rest. He made many provocative remarks. He also said to me and to other Officers that Dr. Evatt had spoken to him as follows:-

"If there is a law left in the land you will win your case".

A further report regarding the occupation by the Military and the action being taken to prepare an inventory will be submitted at a later date.

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES.

As instructed by the Deputy Crown Solicitor, Officers of this Branch - Messrs. Barnwell and Magnusson - accompanied by Captain Bray of the Military, and Detective Sergeant Swasbrick and Constable Pratt of the M.P.I., visited the premises known as 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield, at 11.40 a.m. on Friday, 8th May, 1942.

In the absence of Mr. MacGillivray, Mr. Magnusson and Captain Bray, accompanied by the two M.P.I. Officers, saw Mr. P. D. Rees, next in line to Mr. MacGillivray. Captain Bray delivered a letter to Mr. Rees, copy of which is attached. Mr. Magnusson then, as instructed, served a notice signed by the Deputy Crown Solicitor (copy attached) on Mr. Rees.

Mr. Rees, on receipt of the letter handed to him by Captain Bray, said:

"I suppose this is the same as Jackett's Mill got?" (Jackett's Mill is an adjoining property). As this was in the form of an observation, a reply was not made. When Mr. Magnusson handed Mr. Rees his notice, Mr. Rees replied as follows:-

"Mr. MacGillivray is away. I do not know whether I can get in touch with him. However, I will have the requirements of the notice carried out".

Mr. Magnusson then proceeded to serve a notice to each resident of the property known as 7 Beresford Road. Altogether 60 notices were served without incident. Immediately after the receipt of the notice by Mr. Rees the residents commenced making preparations to leave and such work was carried on into the night. Such quick progress was made by them that all except about 10 had left the premises, sleeping elsewhere that night. The remaining ten included Mr. and Mrs. MacGillivray and Mr. Rees.

The utmost harmony prevailed throughout the proceedings. The question of a definition and the removal of articles classed as personal effects presented numerous problems. However, having regard to the avoidance of unpleasant incidents, the Officers were instructed to err slightly in favour of the inmates.

This morning, on receipt of instructions from the Deputy Crown Solicitor, I interviewed Messrs. MacGillivray and Rees regarding an application made to the Commonwealth Government for an extension of time to vacate the premises. I mentioned to Mr. MacGillivray that it was not the intention of the Commonwealth to cause them serious inconvenience, and that a reasonable extension would be favourably considered. Mr. MacGillivray stated that whilst it was possible to vacate by the time required, it would be greatly appreciated if an extension could be granted to 3 p.m. this day. I then said to Mr. MacGillivray that perhaps 5 p.m. would see the whole thing through, to which he amicably agreed.

I then communicated by telephone with the Deputy Crown Solicitor to confirm the five hour extension. I took the precautions

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES.

I attach hereto for consideration, letter received today from Jehovah's Witness leader Rees applying for the use of additional space at 7, Beresford Road, Strathfield, for use as a hospital in an emergency.

It is presumed, having regard to the teachings and attitude of Jehovah's Witnesses, that the space is intended for use only by and for Jehovah's Witnesses. It could only be used for minor casualties as all doctors, hospital staff and equipment, would be required for service under the proper N.E.S. Authorities according to plans already made. At present the authorities have not the power to take charge of injured persons and put them in hospital against their wish: in the event of raids, however, it would seem that they must have this power as qualified persons to attend to the injured will, no doubt, only be available at prescribed places. I am informed that First Aid Posts already established at Strathfield are adequate for the district and that plans for the reception of hospital cases have been completed.

This Office is opposed to any further consideration being given to Jehovah's Witnesses. No reason can be seen for granting this application for space for treatment of injured persons. All residents at 7, Beresford Road, have their own beds and could use them in the event of minor injuries - if such injuries were sufficiently bad to put them to bed yet not warrant attention at a recognised hospital. The space already used by the residents includes a large lounge room and another large room which is used as an office by Rees besides an extra large dining-room and kitchen and the bakery and cellars in the basement.

I have not sent out an interim reply to the attached letter. It is noted that Watchtower Bible and Tract Society notepaper has been used and Rees describes himself as "Secretary".



JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES.

At about 10.30 a.m. to-day, Mr. Murray of the Peace Officer Section advised that a Rudders lorry was waiting at 7, Beresford Road, Strathfield to deliver a case of books addressed to a Mr. W. Doherty. Peace Officer Mulley had held up delivery whilst he obtained instructions as to procedure from this Office. An amount of £1/7/7 was to be paid on the case before delivery.

I advised Mr. Murray that the Peace Officer should wait until the parcel was delivered off the lorry and that the Peace Officer should then examine the contents. I stressed the point that we were not concerned until the carrier handed over the parcel.

Fifteen minutes or so later Mr. Rees rang to report that an incident occurred in which Peace Officer Mulley assaulted him. He said he endeavoured to use the telephone set apart for the Peace Officers because the other line attached to the residence (for use by the Jehovah's Witnesses) was out of order and had been out of order all the morning and Peace Officer Mulley prevented him doing so with the result that the assault occurred.

Immediately following receipt of Mr. Rees' report I tested both telephone lines connected to 7 Beresford Road and found that both worked normally. In addition I enquired of the local exchange and found that neither had been reported out of order.

I then visited 7 Beresford Road, as instructed. Statements by Peace Officer Mulley and Mr. Rees are attached. It will be seen that my advice with regard to handling the matter of the Doherty case of books had not been followed. If Peace Officer Mulley had not possessed himself of the carrier's papers relating to the case of books - and it seems unnecessary for him to have done so - most likely no incident would have occurred.

However, the reason why the Peace Officer laid his hands on Rees was because the latter entered what is known as the "Inquiry Office" and, according to the Peace Officer, would not leave when requested to do so. Rees' excuse for entering the "Inquiry Office" that the telephone supplied for his use was out of order is lame in the circumstances, especially when it seems that his statement that the telephone was out of order is an untruth.

Further action does not seem warranted. It is to be regretted, however, that the Peace Officer, after asking for instruction did not carry them out especially when, as it is now found, the case of books was not intended for 7 Beresford Road, but for a 7th Day Adventist address in The Boulevard, Strathfield. The carrier's delivery slip showed incorrectly the address of Doherty as 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield.

With reference to your memorandum W.2300 of 21st July 1941,
I attach hereto replies received from Inspector Mitchell, Sydney,
to the questionnaire set out in your memorandum.

With regard to the reference in the last paragraph of the report, Inspector Mitchell stated at that time that certain Peace Officers stationed at Strathfield engaged in friendly conversation with persons resident on the property and, in so doing, discussed the views of other Peace Officers indiscreetly. To obviate such conversations, Mr. Mitchell took steps to transfer certain men and, in his replies, you will see that seven(7) of the Peace Officers who were deemed indiscreet have been transferred or are about to be transferred.

2. Yes. Most of the food used is produced on the farms operated by Jehovah's Witnesses; the remainder is donated or purchased from donations of money. The Commonwealth has no commitments so far as is known.
3. It is understood, and we are assured, none; but no investigation has been made to confirm this.
4. Number or description not noted. Car had disappeared before fracas ended. Inquiries by Police failed to identify the car and, when questioned, the driver is stated to have refused to assist in such identification.
5. Peace Officer Campbell is being transferred from 7 Beresford Road.
6. The position has also exercised my mind; since taking over on 18/1/1941 three men have been transferred and four men are now being transferred - see answer to question 10.
7. The Guard has been instructed that persons carrying bags etc. entering or leaving the premises should submit those bags etc. for inspection and if they did not do so the bags etc. were not to be allowed to pass (arrangements being made whereby such inspection be done on the premises so as to avoid attracting attention if desired).

30th July, 1941.

The inspection of bags seems an essential precaution and necessary to carry out the provisions of the Attorney-General's Order of 17th January, 1941. The Guard has been instructed to exercise tact and, further, MacGillivray was informed that it was a condition of the continued occupation of the premises that any person entering or leaving the premises should submit any bag or parcel carried for inspection by the Guard. I have the view, however, that the Peace Officers at Strathfield are guarding Commonwealth property in the same way as Peace Officers at other stations, and therefore, that the National Security (Subversive Associations) Regulations do not apply.

8. It has been arranged that each shift will include a fairly experienced Peace Officer but we have only six (6) Peace Officers with Police experience:- two (2) in a supervisory capacity: one (1) at the Mascot Aerodrome: one (1) at Rose Bay Air Port, and two (2) at important posts on wharves, hence it is not possible to put three (3) men with Police experience at Strathfield, the posts as above are, in my opinion, more important. Ex Police of good character - unless Police pensioners - are not available for employment and the hours and conditions are not attractive to men over sixty (60) years in receipt of excellent pensions.
9. The entrance to the premises is a wide opening where there were probably, at one time, double gates. The expense of supplying gates seemed unwarranted and the fixing of a chain across the opening has been considered but not proceeded with as this might lead to accidents.
10. Please see final paragraph of my Z.149 of 20th May, 1941. Although it does not seem that friendliness between Peace Officers and residents should be discouraged so long as the Peace Officers satisfactorily carry out their duty, certain Peace Officers seem to have been indiscreet in their conversation with the residents insofar as they discuss the private views of other Peace Officers. The transfer of seven (7) Peace Officers who might be so indiscreet has been effected or is in progress.

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES.

I am in receipt of your memorandum dated 14th July, 1941, forwarding reports and statements from the officers concerned, regarding the friction between the Peace Officers stationed at 7 Beresford Road and MacGillivray and his associates.

I do not think it would be politic, on practically the eve of the High Court action, to eject Rees and MacGillivray and family from the premises. They have been there on sufferance for six months, and, to turn them out at this stage, might appear to savour of vindictiveness.

There are a few matters arising from the reports on which the following comments are made and as to certain of these matters further information is desired:-

- (1) How many male and how many female witnesses (single and married to be stated separately) at present reside at 7 Beresford Road? How many were in residence on 17th January last?
- (2) Do they have their meals on the premises? If so, who pays for the food and groceries? Has the Commonwealth any commitments in the matter of payment?
- (3) How many are engaged in employment other than employment connected with the banned bodies?
- (4) Whose car was MacGillivray using on the night of the fracas concerned? If a Watch Tower Society car, by whose permission is he using it? Is it garaged on the premises?
- (5) Re P.O. Dundon's statement dated 7th July, 1941, re P.O. Campbell's failure to co-operate with him - Has disciplinary action been taken against Campbell?
- (6) As to Inspector Mitchell's memoranda dated 15th and 20th May last covering statements by Peace Officers Sharp and Hobbs, no good purpose would be served by pursuing this matter any further, but I am somewhat disturbed regarding the innuendoes contained therein regarding the relationship between the Peace Officers and the residents of 7 Beresford Road.
- (7) As to the refusal of Mrs. MacGillivray's unknown friend to open her bag for search, regulation 5(3.) of the National Security (Subversive Associations) Regulations provides that no woman shall, in pursuance of the powers conferred by those Regulations, be searched except by a woman. The lady in question, when leaving the premises, refused to open her bag, and the forcible search of her bag by a male Police Officer would, I think, be a contravention of regulation 5(3.). If she were entering the premises and so refused, she could be refused admission. In this matter, Peace Officers should be instructed to be most tactful, as the Regulations only confer a power of search on Police or Peace Officers not below the rank of Sergeant and on certain authorized officers and persons.
- (8) Would it not be possible to arrange for one experienced Peace Officer, e.g. with police training, to be always on duty at these premises?

(9) Could not the gates by which motor cars enter the premises be locked and all cars prohibited from entering the premises? This would eliminate any friction arising out of the necessity for searching cars.

(10) The impudence and insolence now displayed by certain officers of the organization may be attributable to a desire to obtain evidence in connexion with the forthcoming case. On the other hand, it may have been provoked by the behaviour of Peace Officers stationed on the premises, e.g. gossiping about the morals of the ladies resident there. The Commonwealth has, if anything, been over generous to these people, but, at this stage, it is not desired to do anything that might be construed as "pin-pricking" or to furnish any evidence to assist them in the forthcoming action.



With reference to your minute on my Z. 149 of 15th May, 1941 (which is returned herewith), I have to advise that Rees states he had heard that Hobbs when in conversation with another Peace Officer had referred to the women resident at 7 Beresford Road in objectionable terms and that he (Rees) intended by his words to convey to Hobbs that he did not want him referring to the women in such terms.

The words alleged to have been used by Hobbs did not indicate that the persons referred to were immoral, and, whilst it is not thought necessary to repeat them herein, I consider them less offensive than "you black skunk", the words alleged to have been used to Hobbs by Rees. Furthermore, there is not corroboration of Hobbs' remark, and such a remark used in conversation between Peace Officers could occur quite easily in their normal exchange of views.

It appears that certain of the Peace Officers stationed at Strathfield engage in friendly conversation with persons resident on the property and in doing so discuss the *private* views of other Peace Officers indiscreetly. Steps now being taken (with a view to preserving the employment of Peace Officers at Strathfield who have relatively long service by transferring them to posts on wharves where they have greater security of tenure, will lessen the chance of friendship between Guard and residents at Strathfield which, in the light of the above, is a possible cause of friction.

I forward herewith statements made by Peace Officers Hobbs and Sharp in connection with an altercation between Mr. P. D. Rees and Hobbs on 8th May, 1941.

Rees, who is former Secretary of the now dissolved International Bible Students' Association and one of the persons allowed to reside at 7 Beresford Road, called at this Office to-day accompanied by Mr. Jameson, and admitted to me in the presence of Mr. J. R. Magnusson of this Branch that he committed a technical assault on Hobbs on the occasion to which the Peace Officers' statements refer. Rees said to me in the presence of Magnusson that he arrived on the premises between 5.15 and 5.30 p.m. on the date in question and soon afterwards turned off the light referred to. He states that he then went to Hobbs in a state of annoyance and grabbed Hobbs' clothes in the vicinity of the shoulder, saying: "Look here, Buddy, don't you turn those lights on half way through the afternoon - you are not paying for them.

Rees' action was most provocative and in view of his position and influence amongst the residents it might easily have caused a serious disturbance. The offence does not disclose ground for action against him under the National Security Regulations, nor is it an offence under Section 76 of the Commonwealth Crimes Act. I am strongly of the opinion, however, that some action should be taken and the evidence might be considered as to whether he should be charged with assault. Alternatively, it is suggested that Rees be warned off the premises and refused re-admission.

I personally spoke strongly to Rees as to his actions and attitude.

Edward Victor SHARP states

I am a Peace Officer stationed at the property 7 Bereford Road, Stratfield. Yesterday, Tuesday, 8th May 1941, I was on the 3pm to 11pm shift with Peace Officers Hobbs, Johnson and Lund and my post from 3pm to 7pm was on the balcony. About 5.30pm I went to Peace Officer Hobbs at the Inquiry Office post to complain about the balcony light which had fused. Whilst I was at the Inquiry Office post P.O. Hobbs left me saying "I will be back in a moment" Hobbs went down to the light outside the shed opposite the literature store and switched it on. I had noticed that this light had previously been alight that evening. After a few minutes P.O. Hobbs returned and practically on his heels Mr Rees, whom I know as a resident on the premises and formerly Secretary of the now dissolved International Bible Students Association. Mr Rees said "Look here 'Buddy' you have no authority to put those lights on. You are not paying for it and you can shoot that out" Mr Rees then said "Who put that light on" and P.O. Hobbs said "I did" Rees then adopted a fighting attitude and put his hand on P.O. Hobbs shoulder. Hobbs then said "Dont do that. Dont be foolish. I have every right". Mr Rees then said "Look here 'Buddy' what right have you to be 'piss wigging' about with our girls. You black skunk" P.O. Hobbs said nothing else and Rees immediately left. The whole episode occupied only a few minutes.

WILLIAM HERBERT THOMAS HOBBS states:-

I am a Peace Officer employed on the guard over the property at 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield. I was on duty yesterday, Thursday, 8th May, 1941 on the 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. shift together with Peace Officers Sharp, Johnson and Lund. My position for the first half of the shift was at the Inquiry Office and the Officer in this position attends to the lights. At 5.30 p.m. I endeavoured to switch on the light at the southern end of the printery but found that it would not operate. I then went to the second light which is situated near the shed opposite the literature store and I switched that on. The Street lights were on at the time. About five (5) minutes later Mr. Rees, who is a resident on the premises with others with Commonwealth permission and whom I know was formerly Secretary of the now dissolved International Bible Students Association, came in in a car with Mr. MacGillivray. Mr. MacGillivray alighted from the car at the premises and Mr. Rees drove on and parked the car in the garage. A few minutes later, Mr. Rees appeared at the Inquiry Office where I was engaged in conversation with Peace Officer Sharp. Mr. Rees appeared very excited and he said - "Who put that light on?" I replied "I did". He said - "You have no right to as you don't pay for it. It's not dark enough yet". Putting ~~his~~ his hand on my chest he said - "And I don't want you ^{"Piss WICKING"} my girls; get out you black skunk. You can shoot that to Mr. Mitchell" He then left the Inquiry Office and entered the residence. I then went to the light in question and put it on. It was not interfered with again during the night. Peace Officer Sharp was present during the whole of the episode. Mr. Rees was not near me again until after 7 p.m. when I was on duty at the front gate position in accordance with the roster. Shortly after 7 p.m. he left the property by the front gate and did not speak, but about 8 o'clock when he returned walking through the front gate where I was still on duty, he said "Hobbs, are you feeling for a fight?" or words to that effect. I did not answer and he proceeded on his way to the residence. I was alone on that occasion.

Further to my report per telephone about 9 p.m. on 6th July, 1941 regarding an altercation between certain of the Peace Officer guard at 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield, and certain of the residents of those premises, in which Peace Officer Hopton suffered a wound in the jaw and abrasions, and Mr. Alexander MacGillivray, former head of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society in Australia a bullet wound in the fleshy part of the right arm. Accompanied by Officers of this Section, I visited 7 Beresford Road as soon as possible. Copies of Statements made by Peace Officers Dundon and Hopton are attached, together with a copy of Medical Certificate of the Doctor who examined Peace Officer Hopton.

After inquiry at 7 Beresford Road, I consulted the Deputy Crown Solicitor and certain medical practitioners and later Philip David Morgan Rees was arrested and charged at Burwood Police Station with assaulting Peace Officer Hopton; he would make no statement and was subsequently released on fifty pounds (£50) bail. Medical opinion was that MacGillivray, who had been given a drug after his injury, was not fit to be removed. In company with Detective Sergeant Hughes I saw MacGillivray and told him that he would be arrested in the morning. The following morning Medical opinion was still that MacGillivray was not in a condition to be removed but that tomorrow, Tuesday 8th July, he would be sufficiently recovered.

Rees appeared at Burwood Court this morning and the prosecution asked for a remand of seven (7) days. The Defence asked for a remand of one (1) month on the grounds that litigation was pending which might result in the activities of the Peace Officer Guard at 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield, being unlawful. The Magistrate granted a remand until 6th August, 1941 but at the request of the Prosecution increased bail to eighty pounds (£80) plus a surety of eighty pounds (£80) or two of forty pounds (£40) each.

I regard the presence of the residents at 7 Beresford Road, particularly MacGillivray and Rees, as dangerous. The two named adopt an attitude towards the Guard which will eventually exhaust the tact of those who object to it. There have been several minor occurrences as a result. I draw attention to my Z.149 of 15th May, 1941, which reports interference with the Guard in the execution of the duty and technical assault on Peace Officer Hobbs by Rees. I attach, for information, copy of statement by Peace Officer Dundon regarding a minor disturbance in which MacGillivray was involved on 5th July, 1941.

Timothy Francis Dundon states:-

I am a Special Peace Officer stationed at 7 Beresford Rd. Strathfield and reside at 26 Selborne Street, Burwood. At about 3.45 p.m. on 5.7.1941 I was on duty at the Office building and looking through a window of same saw just outside the main building a number of men including MacGillivray and a person named O'Halloran. Shortly afterwards I left the Office and when proceeding to the front gate of the property I passed the group of men previously mentioned. O'Halloran, pointing towards Special Peace Officer Hopton, who was on duty at the gate, said "Can't you give that man something to do; he is sweating too hard." I said "What am I going to do; give him my waddy to swing around?" He said "He will need it and three or four revolvers also". I said "I don't like that, are you thinking of knocking him". He said "I would be hard up". I then walked away towards the gate. I telephoned this information to Mr. Murray at his home. Subsequently at about 7.30 p.m. I was in the Office, waiting for Peace Officer Campbell to relieve me. As he did not appear I decided to go to the back gate and ascertain the reason for his failure to relieve me. A small building, known as the carpenters shop, is used by the guard at the back gate. On passing the window of this building I saw a person pass the window on the inside. I then asked Peace Officers Campbell and Wells who the person was that I had seen. They failed to answer - Campbell then left the building in order to go to the office. I said to Wells "The wireless set here is pretty crook; what station is it on. Lend me your torch, I'll have a ^{section} look at it". Wells did not have a torch. I then walked towards a dark section of the building and struck a match. My suspicions were confirmed when MacGillivray stepped out from the dark. I said "You gave me a fright". He said "I'll frighten you!" MacGillivray then left the building. On my way back to the office I passed MacGillivray and said "You don't want to frighten a man like that" He said "Get back to your mate". I went back to the Office and called Peace Officer Campbell in and said "I want a show down. I'm going to ring Mr. Murray and want you to hear the conversation". I also called Peace Officer Hopton and placed him as a guard at the office door. I telephoned Mr. Murray and during the conversation I saw MacGillivray at the Office door. He forced his way past Hopton and entered the office.

I said "I am having a private conversation with Mr. Murray; if you are a gentleman please leave this office." He refused, and in accordance with instructions from Mr. Murray I prepared to eject him. He, however, left the office and I followed him into the yard and said "Mr. MacGillivray, if you enter the office again you're trespassing on Commonwealth property and I'll put you under arrest." He walked away and I saw nothing further of him that night.

Abney Charles Douglas HOPTON,

States:-

I am a Special Commonwealth Peace Officer, employed by the Commonwealth Government and at present stationed at 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield, and I reside at 81 Barker Road Strathfield.

On Sunday the 6th July, 1941 I was on duty from 3 p.m. till 11 p.m. At about 8.50 p.m. in company with Peace Officer Dundon, I intercepted a motor car which had entered the front gates at 7 Beresford Road Strathfield. Mr. and Mrs. MacGillivray had stepped out of the car, and I noticed that there were other persons still in the car including Mr. Rees who had his coat and vest off and Mr. Monks who was at the driving wheel. Mr. MacGillivray said to the driver, "back out and take no notice of them". Peace Officer Dundon and I wanted to see what was in the car and we approached it. Mrs. MacGillivray came between Mr. MacGillivray and Peace Officer Dundon, then MacGillivray punched me and struck me on the jaw. I then drew my batton and struck MacGillivary on the left shoulder. I then told Peace Officer Dundon to ring for the Police, he then left in the direction of the office. MacGillivray together with Rees and other men then rushed me, I backed to the front of the building, and then I changed my batton to my left hand and drew my revolver, and said, "stand back or I will shoot". At the same time I continued to back away from them and as they still came, I fired a shot in the air. MacGillivray, Rees and the other men then made a concerted rush at me and I said, "Stop or I will shoot" but they still came, and were only a few feet, approximately 8 feet, when I fired in their direction. When I fired the second shot I was in fear of actual bodily harm. After the second shot I heard a female voice call out, "He has shot him in the arm". At this time they were on top of me I was thrown to the ground kicked about the body and legs. My batton was wrenched from my wrist and Rees twisted the gun out of my hand. Rees was astride my body while I was on the ground and had me by the throat by both hands, and was pressing my throat inwards. He got off me all of a sudden, and then walked off. I got to my feet I was feeling very groggy. I then made a search on the lawn, where I found my service Pistol, it was broken open and there were no cartridges either empty or full in the cylinder.

When I came on duty that pistol was loaded with 4 live cartridges. I made a search for my batton, but failed to find it and have not seen it since. I had no further conversation with MacGillivray or Rees I cannot describe or identify any of the other men that were with MacGillivray apart from a man named Monk, who was driving the car, but I did not identify Monk as one of my assailants, and I did not see him take any actual part in the assault. Shortly after the Police arrived when I informed them what had happened. Later on the same night in company with Detective Sergeant Hughes and Mr. Stewart a Peace Officer of the Commonwealth Investigation Branch, I made a search on the lawn again, where we found 2 live cartridges and one spent shell of a 25 calibre, similar to the brand I use in my pistol. Later on the same night I was confronted with the defendant Rees by Detective Sergeant Hughes, were Rees was informed by Detective Sergeant Hughes regarding the allegation against him. He was cautioned by Detective Sergeant Hughes, that he need not answer any questions or say anything in connection with the allegations unless he wished to do so. On the same night I was taken to the surgery of Dr. Brooks, the Government Medical Officer, Clarence Street, Burwood, but I was not examined. I again attended there at 10 a.m. on the 7th of July, 1941 when I was examined by Dr. Brooks and handed the medical certificate now produced.

Timothy Francis DUNDON,

States:-

I am a Special Commonwealth Peace Officer employed by the Commonwealth Government and at present stationed at 7 Beresford Road Strathfield, and I reside at 26 Selborne Street, Burwood.

At 3 p.m. on Sunday the 6th of July, 1941 I commenced duty at 7 Beresford Road, Strathfield. Special Peace Officer Hopton was also on duty with me. At about 8.55 p.m. on that date I was on post No.1 which is the front gate and as I wanted to obey a call of nature, and I called upon Peace Officer Hopton to relieve me, on my return Peace Officer Hopton and myself intercepted a car at the main entrance at the side of the building, with a number of people in it including Mr. and Mrs. MacGillivray alighted from the car and came round to the drivers side of the car. We then attempted to make an examination of the car and Mr. MacGillivray said to the driver, "Back out and take no notice of them" the driver started to back out and at the same time MacGillivray approached Peace Officer Hopton and struck him on the jaw. Peace Officer Hopton then sang out, "ring the police Tim". I immediately proceeded to the office and rang the Police with difficulty. When I returned to the scene of the assault the car and persons mentioned had left the property.


I have to advise that certain members of the Guard at 7 Beresford Road are very disturbed. The affair of Sunday night has not had a noticeable effect on the residents at the premises, who appear to regard the action taken by Peace Officer Hopton as the result of directions from "higher up" and deliberately planned. Mr. MacGillivray, himself, subscribes to this view and he has great influence over the other residents. Distorted views taken by Jehovah's Witnesses not in contact with Strathfield since Sunday is shown in a telegram from Erik Baird, Townsville, to MacGillivray lodged today as follows:

"Congratulations on escape crude attempt and attack upon your life and companions stop Townsville community shocked and violently indignant Nazi Storm Trooper methods reported press be of good courage - Eric Baird"

Only yesterday a further incident capable of developing the same way as that on Sunday occurred. An unknown woman carrying a bag and accompanied by Mrs. MacGillivray was leaving the premises. Peace Officer Dundon, on duty at the gate, reports he asked courteously to see the contents of the bag but the woman failed to answer and Mrs. MacGillivray said "Oh, no you wnn't" and both passed on their way. Dundon did not carry out his duty and his explanation is that he was afraid of a development similar to that on Sunday night. Dundon was connected with the Sunday night affair and, with other Peace Officers, is anxious as to the outcome especially as no action was taken as a result of Rees' technical assault on Peace Officer Hobbs on the 8th May, 1941 (reported in my memorandum, Z.149, of 15th May, 1941). In addition, the Guard has been informed that MacGillivray proposed charging Peace Officer Hopton with attempted murder or inflicting grievous bodily harm or something.

Our Peace Officer Guard is composed of middle aged men, not possessing any outstanding qualifications and inexperienced in exercising authority. The attitude recently adopted by the leaders of Jehovah's Witnesses, is simply a flouting of Commonwealth Authority. It was tacitly understood that MacGillivray would co-operate in the requirements of the Commonwealth entrance and egress, searching of bags etc. as a condition of himself and adherents being permitted to continue to occupy the premises, but the incident of Sunday, 6th instant, clearly indicates the militant aggressive attitude now adopted.

In my opinion, the Commonwealth should take drastic steps in enforcing respect for their authority. I would suggest that MacGillivray and family and Rees be put off, and kept off, the premises.

The material exempted consists of the name or signature of an ASIO officer.

Reasons for the decision

1. There has always existed an understanding between ASIO and its employees that their anonymity should be preserved, both during and after their employment by the organisation. In addition the *Australian Security Intelligence Organisation Act 1979* prohibits the publication of the identities of present and former ASIO officers.


The public identification of ASIO officers, past or present, would assist ASIO's targets to identify ASIO personnel who had been engaged in security operations against them. This could affect ASIO's ability to carry out its statutory responsibilities and in consequence cause damage to the security of the Commonwealth.

Section 33(1)(a) of the Archives Act provides that a record is exempt from public access if it contains information the disclosure of which could reasonably be expected to cause damage to the security of the Commonwealth. The information is therefore exempt from public access under section 33(1)(a) of the Archives Act.

2. In view of the understanding, referred to above, between ASIO and its employees, the public identification of present or former ASIO employees would be a breach of confidence. Section 33(1)(d) of the Archives Act provides that a record is exempt from public access if it contains information or matter the disclosure of which would constitute a breach of confidence. The information is therefore exempt from public access under section 33(1)(d) of the Archives Act.

3. Some members of the public may take an unfavourable view of ASIO and its employees. The public identification of present or former employees of ASIO could result in their embarrassment or harassment and would be an unreasonable disclosure of their personal affairs. Section 33(1)(g) of the Archives Act provides for the exemption of information the disclosure of which would constitute an unreasonable disclosure of the personal affairs of any person (including a deceased person). The information is therefore exempt from public access under section 33(1)(g) of the Archives Act.

I refer to your minute (undated) from file 72/108 seeking our views on a request that Jehovah's Witnesses attending a Watch Tower Convention in Sydney in December 1973 be provided with accommodation in Commonwealth Migrant Hostels.

2. As the amount of hostel accommodation in use throughout 1973/74 is to be tailored to actual immigration requirements it would be impracticable to let the Watch Tower Society have any significant quantity of accommodation in operating migrant hostels.

3. Except for Villawood, which we consider should be kept available at all time to meet unforeseen migration demand, we would have no objection to any hostels on a care and maintenance basis being operated by the Company for the Society - provided of course total costs (including opening and reclosing expenses) were fully recovered. (By December 1973 it is possible that Cabramatta and Villawood will be the only hostels in the Sydney area on a care and maintenance basis).


4. When considering the Watch Tower Society's request you may wish to have regard to the possible reaction of the private accommodation industry should Government facilities be made available to delegates to the Convention.



Assisted Passage Scheme.
Eligibility of Applicants Known to be
Conscientious Objectors.



It has been a long standing rule that applications for assisted passages from persons who are known to be conscientious objectors to military service should be dealt with individually on their merits. The relatively small number of applications received from persons claiming to be conscientious objectors relate mainly to persons whose views are based upon their religious beliefs, for example Jehovah's Witnesses.

Since the re-introduction of National Service, staff interviewing migrants overseas ensure that persons (or families) likely to be directly affected by the Scheme are aware of requirements to register for National Service and of the liability to be called up for military service. In each case the applicant receives a copy of a leaflet outlining the National Service Scheme.

Where it comes to notice that an applicant is a conscientious objector the question of obligations under the National Service Act and the need to satisfy a Court of his conscientious beliefs to secure exemption, is discussed fully.

The Chief Migration Officer, London, has received an assisted passage application from Mr. C. D. Walker, a single man, 19 years of age who indicated at selection interview he would object to military service because of his religious beliefs. The applicant is regarded as otherwise suitable for inclusion in the scheme and the Chief Migration Officer, London has sought advice on the acceptability of conscientious objectors under the assisted passage scheme.

The basis for considering applications from conscientious objectors was previously reviewed in March 1968 and Mr. Armstrong (who is making the present enquiry) after discussion with the Minister endorsed the papers as follows:-

"He (Mr. Snedden) does not wish to Department to regard membership of the "Jehovah's Witness" Sect as precluding the grant of assisted passages. Therefore these cases should be determined in accordance with normal requirements."

Decisions in individual cases have continued to be taken only after assessment of all other factors as

to health, character and the migrant gain.

Wherever a person liable to perform national service presents himself to be a conscientious objector care is taken to ensure he understands the prescribed course to be followed to apply for an exemption from national service.

I recommend for approval:

1. Retention of the existing arrangements namely that a decision upon assisted passage applications be considered individually after assessment of all factors.
2. Mr. Walker who has otherwise met the requirements of the scheme be granted an assisted passage.

81. HUBBARD ASSOCIATION OF SCIENTOLOGISTS

81.1 Applications for assisted passages lodged by persons who are known to be members of the Hubbard Association of Scientologists should be refused. Applications for unassisted migration by members of the organisation should be referred to the Department of Immigration, Canberra, for consideration in the light of the migration gain involved and of any special features that may exist.

81.2 Officers overseas are unlikely to know that an applicant or nominee is a member of the organisation unless the information is volunteered. It may therefore be of assistance to note that the organisation generally functions under the name of the Hubbard Association of Scientologists (H.A.S.I.) and in addition to a variety of organisations incorporating the words "Hubbard", "Scientology", and "Scientologists", is also known to conduct what are termed "Colleges of Personal Efficiency", and "American Colleges of Business Efficiency". The association has its headquarters in Britain and although believed to be more active in that country and the United States than elsewhere, it is said to be established in all non-Communist countries.

Please refer to your memorandum 57/65904 of 20th January, 1970 and attachment.

2. A review of our records on the above subject reveals that your correspondence has not been answered. The oversight is regretted.

3. The form in which your current instruction on the subject to overseas posts appears has been noted (Paragraph 80 of Admission for Residence of European Aliens).

4. The security assessment of the Sect is that membership in itself is not considered adverse but a particular situation may arise, such as war or emergency, in which the activities of the Sect may become prejudicial to national security. This possibility derives from a basic tenet of non-recognition of any authority other than that coming directly from God whence the Sect does not consider itself bound to obey civil authority. While its proselytizing may subvert the allegiance of people for religious not political ends, it may under circumstances of war or emergency have political effects. It is understood that during the Second World War it was considered a subversive organization, and for a time it was proscribed under the Wartime Emergency Regulations.

5. There would seem to be no reason under present circumstances why any special security rule relating to sponsorship of members of the Sect should apply. Indeed, there does not seem to be any practical way in which a special rule could apply; for there is no provision on the Form M40 whereby it could be ascertained whether a nominee (or a nominator) were a member of the Sect. Even if it were known, the application should be treated in accordance with the current provisions concerning sponsorship appearing in Part XVII of the Security Checking Handbook.

6. Because of the possibility of security interest in the Sect under certain circumstances, A.S.I.O. has had

to keep it under a certain notice. It has not been of any significant security interest in recent years. For this reason and because, in general, enquiries touching on the religion of applicants are, presumably, undesirable, it is considered that the provisions of Paragraph 80 of your overseas handbook should now be modified. The following is suggested:-

"Membership of this Sect is not a ground for refusing entry. Should it come to the notice of an interviewing officer that an applicant is a Minister or leading member of the Sect, the applicant should not be refused entry on this account, but personal particulars and relevant details should be passed to the Liaison Officer for his information or, at posts where no Liaison Officer is attached, the information should be sent to the Department of Immigration, Canberra."

In the latter case would you kindly make the information available to this Headquarters.

7. It would be appreciated if you would inform us in due course of any proposed amendment.

New York, famous for its "Big" achievements will be the centre for the greatest Christian assembly of the century between July 27 and August 3rd. this year.

Converging from more than 100 different lands and countries earth-wide more than 30,000 overseas delegates will assemble at Yankee Stadium and the adjoining Polo Grounds in company with tens of thousands of Americans.

Australian delegates will travel by three special planes to San Francisco then across the continent by chartered buses. There has also been a section of the "Orsova" booked to transport others.

Amongst the 420 conventioners who make up this contingent from our shores are many who have taken up residence here in Australia during the post war years, and who are looking forward to meeting many of their nationals who, like themselves, have taken up residence in the "free world".

The Watchtower, Bible and Tract Society, who are sponsoring this eight day international assembly, are well known for their world wide dissemination of Bible research.

In 1953 a similar convention filled Yankee Stadium to overflowing with a climactic attendance of 165,829 persons.

A Watchtower spokesman said that literally thousands of New Yorkers will be conducting a door to door canvass for accommodation to house the enormous influx of persons soon to arrive at the assembly site. Blocks of hotel accommodation have already been booked out.

Asked what time would be consumed in this unusual activity, the spokesman said that if in 1953 all the time spent had been put in by one man working 24 hours each day it would have taken him 14 years to accomplish. This year it was expected that the attendance would increase by at least 25%.

Questioned on what was hoped to be accomplished by the assembly he said, "In this age of international conflict, hot and cold wars and ideological struggles, a great loss of faith is evident. One can see this in the breakdown of respect for the ordinary principles of citizenship. "It will serve as a powerful rebuttal to those who claim it is impossible for men from all nations to live in peace and unity."

"Men can and will live at peace with his neighbor." he concluded. "And this 1958 International Assembly of Jehovah's witnesses will prove it."

I refer to Commonwealth Migration Officer, Melbourne's memorandum dated 10th December, 1957, (V57/47875) (copy attached for reference) regarding the proposed admission (for six weeks) of Karl K. STEWART, Phillipine Branch Superintendent of the Watch Tower Society, and have noted that Mr. STEWART's proposed tour would include the South Pacific Islands.

2. The Watch Tower Society is the "Watch Tower Bible & Tract Society" (Jehovah's Witnesses) and has already been the subject of correspondence between us, terminating in your memorandum dated 3rd June, 1957, (57/65904). In the circumstances, I do not wish to withhold a security clearance to the proposed visit of Mr. STEWART, subject of course to satisfactory completion of a local check.

3. I have recently been in touch with The Secretary, Department of Territories, Canberra, as I wished to ensure that he should be aware of the implication of the alteration to your Department's policy in regard to the grant of visas for the admission to Australia of aliens who are Jehovah's Witnesses. I have not heard from the Secretary and presumably he is still considering his Department's position. Accordingly, I would suggest that if there is any question of Mr. STEWART visiting any of the areas administered by the Department of Territories then it should be made clear to Mr. STEWART that such visits will be considered in the light of the Department of Territories policy in operation at the time, for admission to the area concerned.

I refer to your memorandum of 1st August, 1957 (Ref. Q57/7614) concerning the question of Jehovah's Witnesses dissuading migrants from attending naturalization ceremonies.

Your report has been considered and although it seems that Mrs. Horsburgh at least is opposed to naturalization, there does not appear to have been any widespread action on the part of members of the sect to discourage migrants generally from seeking to become Australian citizens. In fact, the episode involved only members of the sect, whose attitude to certain of the duties of citizenship is well known.

In all the circumstances there appears to be insufficient justification for further action. Would you please advise Mr. Hulme verbally of the outcome of the investigations.

Report alleging action by Jehovah's Witnesses to disuade aliens from seeking naturalization.

Recently Mr. A.S. Hulme, M.P. brought under notice information he had received from the person in charge of the New Settlers League at Redcliffe, that members of the Jehovah's Witness sect had persuaded some German migrants from attending a naturalization ceremony as onlookers.

The C.M.O. Brisbane was asked to investigate the matter. When he contacted Mr. Hulme he ascertained that Mrs. Alexander, a New Settlers League Contact Worker was the source of the information.

This lady was seen and she advised that following a suggestion by her to Mr. Alois Frisch that he should go along to a naturalization ceremony as a matter of interest, she was contacted by Mrs. G.B. Horsburgh who said she was a Jehovah Witness, as was Mr. Frisch, and that he could not attend the ceremony as his beliefs were opposed to "owing allegiance to any earthly power". Mrs. Alexander heard nothing further in the matter.

At an interview with an officer from the Brisbane office, Mrs. Horsburgh was reluctant to discuss her attitude to naturalization, but she did say she was too busy 'witnessing' to attend naturalization ceremonies. She advised that the three German families whose names were mentioned were brought to Redcliffe by Mr. G.D. Wilken himself a German migrant and also a member of the Jehovah's Witness sect. Mrs. Horsburgh claimed Wilken's intention ~~to~~ securing the three other migrant families was to exploit them financially. She did not regard Wilken as a true sect member and she has lost contact with him.

Of the German families, one merely expressed disappointment in Mr. Wilken.

when interviewed at his home
Mr. Frisch claimed he was too busy with his English lessons to attend the ceremony he was asked to go to. When asked his attitude to naturalization he replied "that he could not see any objection as the attitude adopted by his sect was to "Give to Caesar the things that are his and give to Jehovah the things that are his".

Frisch served as a paratrooper in the German Army during the war and the fact that he and his wife drank rum during the interview gave the interviewing officer an impression of a marked difference between the attitude of the Australian members of the sect (apparently latter are ~~to~~ *like* ~~to~~ *blacks*)

All the persons involved in the incident were members of the Jehovah's Witness sect before coming to Australia and are resident in the same suburban area of Brisbane. We know that the Jehovah's Witness sect, as it does not believe in any earthly power, does not allow its adherents to vote or bear arms. In this case however there is no evidence of any widespread action on the part of members of the sect to disuade aliens from seeking to become Australian citizens, nor any attempt to influence other than sect members.

In the circumstances it would seem that no further action is desired in regard to the matter. Mr. Hulme could be advised verbally by the C.M.O. Brisbane of the result of our enquiries.

He spoke with pride of his services as a paratrooper in the German Army during the war. He and his wife drank three small glasses of neat rum and this fact coupled with his pride in his Army Service was markedly different from that of the Australian members of this sect. On the other hand it is possible that the reason he gave of his non-attendance at the Naturalization Ceremony was specious.

8. It was ascertained that all four of the German families involved were members of the Jehovah's Witness sect in Germany. All interviews, with the exception of that with Mrs. Alexander, were conducted in a way that did not disclose the true purpose of the enquiry.

9. My memorandum 56/7491 of 25th June, 1957, subject Francesco Cassaniti covered the return of Naturalization Certificate issued in his favour, No. E.M.(1)10032 and a copy of a letter written by him to the Shire Clerk at Stanthorpe. This letter expressed similar views to those stated by Mrs. Horsburgh to Mrs. Alexander.

Mr. Nulty was approached, but although the conversation was brief, with a natural reticence he was clearly unwilling to disclose his attitude in this matter. When asked had she ever attended a Convention, however, she replied that her late husband had attended a Convention and in "Testimony" which she was continuing on behalf of her late husband Jehovah's Witnesses and that the Com. Migration Officer. were also. *John Nulty* (T.M. NULTY) Com. Migration Officer. 19 August, 1957.

7. *poor* The French family were interviewed at night at their home in Albion and during the course of the conversation the subject of rechristianization was introduced. Mr. French asked what was involved and this was explained to him and he said what if he had ever attended a Methodist meeting. French asked the procedure for himself. He answered that he had been asked by a lady at Redcliffe to do so and that he had done it. Correspondence was then exchanged between the two. French was asked if this was turned to the church and he said it had been. French was asked if he had promised to do this and he replied that he had.

THE A/SECRETARY:

I refer to your memorandum 57/65904 and advise that I rang Mr. A.S. Hulme, M.P., on 24th July, who stated that Mrs. G.M. Alexander, a New Settlers' League Contact Worker in the Redcliffe area, was the source of his information. I advised him that I would have Mr. Annand, O/i.c. Assimilation Division, go to Redcliffe to enquire into the position.

2. Mrs. Alexander was interviewed and stated that she had suggested to Mr. Alois Frisch that he should attend a Naturalization Ceremony at Redcliffe as a matter of interest, to which he agreed. The next day Mrs. G.B. Horsburgh of Georgina Street, Woody Point, rang Mrs. Alexander and told her that Mr. Frisch had mentioned this suggestion to her, but as both Mrs. Horsburgh and Mr. Frisch were Jehovah's Witnesses he could not do so as their beliefs were opposed to owing allegiance to any earthly power. Mrs. Alexander did not have any further contact with Mr. Frisch.

3. Mrs. Horsburgh was interviewed, but although the conversation was turned twice to naturalization she was clearly unwilling to discuss her attitude in this matter. When asked had she ever attended a Ceremony as an observer, she replied that her time was fully occupied with her domestic duties and in "witnessing" which she explained was door to door canvassing on behalf of her sect. She stated that she was a Jehovah's Witness and that the three German families concerned were also.

4. Mrs. Horsburgh stated that the three families, Rode, Frisch and Meissner, who are all German Assisted Migrants, were brought to the Redcliffe area by Mr. George Dietrich Wilken, an Assisted German migrant who arrived in Australia per "Anna Salen" at Melbourne on 16th October, 1954. It transpired that she was very bitter towards Mr. Wilken who was also a member of the Jehovah's Witness sect as he had brought these three families from Bonegilla with the intention of exploiting them financially. He is no longer regarded by the local members of the sect as being a true member. She had entirely lost contact with him and did not know where he is now living.

5. None of the families is now living at the address originally supplied at Westbrook Road, Woody Point.

6. Mrs. Meissner was interviewed but the only information of any value obtained from her was that she reluctantly expressed disappointment in Mr. Wilken and said that she and her husband had lost contact with him.

7. The Frisch family were interviewed at night at their home at Albion and during the course of a long conversation the subject of naturalization was introduced. Mr. Frisch asked what was involved and this was explained to him and he was asked if he had ever attended a Naturalization Ceremony to see the procedure for himself. He answered that he had been asked by a lady at Redcliffe to do so but was too busy with his correspondence lessons in English to attend. The conversation was turned towards his religious beliefs and when asked if they were opposed to Naturalization as explained he replied that he

You will see from Circular No. 58 that applications for visas by people covered by its heading may be dealt with by you and need not be referred here for decision unless a specific character or security objection is raised to an applicant.

As no indication has been given that there are any specific objections to Romano or to the other men whose cases have been referred, it is thought that you may, as a matter of course, be submitting for decisions all such cases you receive. This is not necessary.

If, of course, any case does arise where for security or character reasons you consider reference for decision desirable details as to the nature of the objection must be made available to enable full consideration to be given to the matter here.

Dear Mr. Hulme,

I refer to our recent discussion on the subject of "Jehovah's Witnesses", during which you mentioned a case where a member of this sect had attempted to discourage new settlers from seeking Australian citizenship.

It would be most helpful if you could let me have details of such attempts. If I am placed in a position to confirm by official enquiry that they were made, it will be possible for me then to recommend preventive action for the future.

It is of course a matter of some delicacy to recommend action against members of a religious sect as such, and in fairness to the Minister I am obliged to be very certain of the facts before placing proposals before him. I regard the matter as particularly serious of course and am hopeful that you will be able to obtain full details of the incident for me.

Admission of Amish Mennonites into Canada.

On February 11th, the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration, Mr. Pickersgill, was asked in the House of Commons whether members of the Amish Mennonites sect were being admitted into Canada as immigrants and if they were not, for what reason.

2. In his reply Mr. Pickersgill made it clear that under Canada's current immigrant policy no account whatever was taken of the religion of prospective immigrants. It was therefore not the case that members of the Amish Mennonites sect were excluded for that reason. However, it did happen that some people who were Amish Mennonites objected to accepting citizenship of a country and to participating in elections and other ordinary democratic procedures. As it had always been laid down that the main purpose of Canada's immigration policy was to add to the citizenship of the country such a factor would naturally be taken into account when it was present in a particular case. The same consideration would apply to any other prospective immigrants about whom there was a really serious ground for believing that they did not intend to become citizens.

Since freedom of worship is guaranteed under

You might, in all the circumstances, desire
to convey instructions to your field officers overseas on the

Jehovah's Witnesses - Admission to Australia

I refer to the attached submission.

2. It is not merely "undesirable and dangerous" to base rejections on "religious grounds" - it is quite out of the question. This does not however go to the heart of the matter, which is that Jehovah's Witnesses have in the past been regarded as a possible security risk - and have been rejected on security grounds.

3. This is not drawing any over-fine distinction. One can take the analogy of political views. We do not regard a person's political views as relevant to the question of admission to Australia - so long as those views do not make him a security risk.

4. I think our past policy in regard to Form 40 cases is sound - ~~rule~~ i.e. each case is considered individually, just as it is the ~~rule~~ to consider on an individual basis other applications where there are security questions. This should I think be extended to unsponsored applications. Our officers overseas should in general rely on the security officer's assessment, and in cases of doubt should refer here, where we would obtain the usual advice from A.S.I.O. headquarters and give a decision.

5. What may be needed is a directive from A.S.I.O. headquarters to security officers in the field, on the general security dangers (if any) to be associated with membership of the sect in question - so that security officers will have a uniform basis for assessing various individual cases.

6. Recommended -

- (a) that membership of the sect should not of itself be a bar to admission;
- (b) that each application, whether sponsored or not, be dealt with on its individual merits on the basis of security report thereon, in the same manner as other "security cases";
- (c) that A.S.I.O. be advised of this decision so that, if they so desire, their field officers can be given advice on the general security aspects of membership of the sect.

MEMORANDUM.The Watch Tower and Bible Tract Society
(Jehovah's Witness) Admission of Members.

A full report, dated 8th January, 1954, submitted by the Commonwealth Investigation Service on the above Organisation is attached.

2. Present policy in regard to the entry of members of the Society was laid down by the then Minister in March, 1952. Mr. Holt decided that:-

- (a) applications on Form 47 by members of the Society for entry into Australia should be rejected; and
- (b) members sponsored by residents of Australia should be investigated and applications considered on their individual merits.

3. Although we do not receive a large number of applications involving the entry of members of the Sect, it is difficult, without a clearly defined policy, to consider and decide applications received.

4. Application forms in use in the Department do not call upon applicants for entry into Australia to give particulars of their religious beliefs. Generally, therefore, we remain unaware of the fact that any applicant is of a particular religion until he is interviewed in connection with normal screening processes. Even at this stage it is most unlikely that we would learn of the person's religious belief since, deriving from Section 116 of the Constitution, we have on occasions advised overseas posts that as freedom of worship is guaranteed by the Australian Constitution and it would be definitely opposed to Australian ideals to enquire as to a person's religious faith in the matter of migration, enquiries in this regard should not be made. In view of this we would only become aware that an applicant is a member of the Watch Tower and Bible Tract Society if he volunteered the information.

5. It would seem to me that basing rejection on religious grounds might be undesirable and dangerous since it is obvious that we would not wish it to become known that such is the case.

6. The matter that gives rise to the question at the present time is an application lodged for the entry of a Miss P. Apostolopoulou by her cousin in Victoria. Miss Apostolopoulou has been approved on Selection and medical and Security grounds but at interview she stated her religion to be "Jehovah's Witness". In view of this the Chief Migration Officer, Athens, requests a direction as to whether entry is to be approved.

7. I incline to the view that in cases where no objection is raised on normal grounds of processing a visa should not be withheld on religious grounds.

On 31st July, 1953, you asked this Service to "furnish advice as to the present day activities in Australia, the approximate number of adherents, its financial standing and any other information of a general character which would enable the Department to obtain a complete picture of the Society".

2. Shortly afterwards I interviewed Mr. Horgan, your assistant secretary, and ascertained that your Department's interest sprang from your responsibility for deciding the suitability or otherwise of an applicant seeking permission to enter this country.

3. I informed Mr. Horgan that this was a question of subversive activity which should rightly be answered by the Australian Security Intelligence Organization but if the Director-General of Security consented, I would endeavour to obtain the information sought. He has agreed.

4. An examination of this file shows that in May, 1952, you returned a copy of a recent confidential report on this organization loaned by my predecessor, and it would seem that you only require any additional information that this Service has gathered since the preparation of that report.

5. The information gathered, has, wherever possible, been checked but in a number of instances, this has not been possible, and wherever possible the source of the information is disclosed.

LEGALITY

6. No change in the lawfulness of the organization has occurred since Mr. Justice Williams said "The religion of Jehovah's Witnesses is a Christian religion", and Mr. Justice Starke held that "the association of persons known as Jehovah's Witnesses are not engaged in any seditious enterprise, nor in the printing or publishing of any seditious words within the meaning of the Crimes Act 1914-1932". (1943 C.L.R. 116 et seq)

MEMBERSHIP AND ACTIVITY

Western Australia.

7. The organization in this State is registered as a corporate body and as such four of its members are authorized to celebrate marriages and conduct burial services. The persons at present holding these rights are:-

8. The headquarters of the organization in Western Australia is at 68 Broome Street, Sth Perth. Nine groups exist in the Metropolitan area and there are twenty congregations in the country, the main ones being Narrogin, Bellsbrook and Mt. Barker.

9. Membership in the Metropolitan area totals 650, whilst between 300 and 350 adherents form the congregations in the country.

South Australia.

10. The headquarters of the Adelaide group is Kingdom Hall, Sturt Street, Adelaide, and small groups of Jehovah's Witnesses operate at outer suburbs of Adelaide, namely at Seacliff, Salisbury and Mt. Lofty and there are seven units in the Metropolitan area.

11. They own the freehold of their property, Kingdom Hall at 33 Sturt Street, the capital value being approximately £10,000. There is a small mortgage of £200 on it.

12. It is believed that total membership in this State is between 1,000 and 1,500.

(unconfirmed)

13. Observations show that the average attendance at meetings held at Kingdom Hall on Sundays, Tuesdays and Fridays is forty-six persons.

14. Mr. Hubert Clift, formerly of the South Australian Police Department is the leader of the congregation at Kingdom Hall.

(unconfirmed)

Victoria. The properties belonging to this organization are registered in the name of International Bible Students.

15. Local headquarters are situated at 20A George Street, East Melbourne. This building is situated at the rear of 20 George Street and has been converted from out-house buildings to conform with the standards of a church and meeting place. However, it is believed that it has no congregation, and is merely used as a distributing centre for propaganda and lectures for Church leaders. This property is owned by the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society and has a full rated value of £280 (Municipal records).

16. As far as could be ascertained, the only other assets held by this Society is Kingdom Hall, 256 Murray Road, Preston, which is valued at £1,300 and which is nominally owned by Messrs H. Hall, L. Lehman and A. Grey (Municipal records).

17. During their Convention held in Melbourne last year, one of the speakers claimed the Victorian membership at 1,100. Subsequent enquiries indicate that of this number, over 600 are metropolitan residents.

18. Headquarters are at 11 Newgate Street, North Hobart. No figures are available of membership.

18. From conversations with members of the sect, one of my investigators ascertained that there are eleven congregations meeting regularly in the Metropolitan area. These meeting places were at various halls in Albion, Coburg, Collingwood, Footscray, Hawthorn, Ivanhoe, Mordialloc, Newmarket, Oakleigh, Prahran and Preston.

19. So far as could be established by personal observation and discussion with members, the principle office bearers in this State are:-

20. From personal observations at Victorian meetings it was gathered that the main function of all members of the sect is the dissemination of their religious teachings and they regard themselves as Missionaries of Jehovah in this world. (see article in Pix 5.9.1953)

New South Wales.

21. The headquarters of the Australian Branch is at 11 Beresford Road, Strathfield. The leader of the Branch is Theodore Jaracz, of Polish extraction and the secretary is E. B. Mason of the same address.

22. There are eighteen congregations in Sydney. At Albury the full time minister is Stefenofas Jurgis of 57 McCauley Street, Albury, a New Australian who arrived in this country in May, 1949.

(unconfirmed)

23. The properties belonging to this organization are registered in the name of International Bible Students' Association and in the names of individual members. They are mainly situated on the block of land bounded by Beresford and Homebush Roads, and The Crescent at Strathfield. No. 11 Beresford Road is valued (for rating purposes) at £22,500, and the total value of properties on The Crescent at £14,200.

24. No separate State membership figures are available for New South Wales.

Queensland.

25. The headquarters of the organization is at 119 Musgrave Road, Red Hill, Brisbane.

26. Membership is believed to be about 500.

27. No ownership of property can be traced.

Tasmania.

28. Headquarters are at 41 Newdegate Street, North Hobart. No figures are available of membership.

29. In November, 1950, the Society held a two day Assembly in the Hobart Town Hall, and two overseas members, D. H. MacLean of Halifax, Nova Scotia and R. F. Smart of Toronto attended.

30. Early in 1950 a Convention was held in New York and the undermentioned persons are believed to have attended:-

GENERAL INFORMATION

Membership in Australia.

31. During the Convention held in 1953 in Melbourne, a speaker claimed that the membership in Australia exceeded 7,000.

32. Attendance throughout the Melbourne Convention was approximately 1,500 at most sessions, culminating with the final session on Sunday, October, 18th, when about 6,000 people were present. This particular session was addressed by T. Jaracz, entitled "After Armageddon - God's New World" and was widely advertised throughout the city. It is thought that the number present included many who were not subscribers to the Society's doctrines, and possibly some were pleasure seekers taking advantage of some means of entertainment on a Melbourne Sunday afternoon.

Finance.

33. Little information is available on the financial status of this Society. They do not levy tithes nor is a direct subscription imposed. At congregation meetings, as at the Melbourne Convention, no collection is taken, however, receptacles are provided for any contribution that a person feels able to give. It would appear that possibly the only sources of income, therefore, are the proceeds of these voluntary contributions, and profits made on the publication and sale of literature. However, meetings do not give the impression that the organization is by any means poverty stricken, in fact, at the recent Melbourne Convention, no expense was spared to ensure its success. The cost of hiring the Exhibition Building was £45 per day for each of the four days of the Convention plus additional expenditure for the use of office, telephone, decorations, stage and effects and public address system (confirmed).

34. Some indication of their activity and possible financial position may be gained from the following figures of the importation of "The Watch Tower" and "Awake" from June 1948 to May, 1951. These import licences are obtained on a "no exchange" basis and are admitted duty free.

35. In September, 1950, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, New York, sent a letter to the Import Licensing Branch, Sydney, stating: "It is through gift shipment of religious literature to Australia that our Society finances its Christian education programme in Australia. We consider such literature is our contribution to the welfare and spiritual instruction of the Australian people".

36. These books are landed in Australia free of cost. Publishers on house to house visits ask 4/- per book (verified by purchase). No payments have been made to the United States of America for religious literature imported by the Society (Exchange Control).

37. An import licence granted in September, 1952, totalled £3,006 and comprised -

38. In 1941, Jehovah's Witnesses in Australia were openly engaged in commerce and trade. Their operations included sawmills, farming, engineering, printing, investment in New Zealand flax, tin and gems. All the commercial ventures were later sold, and it is suspected, to members of the Society, and it is likely that they are merely held in trust.

39. To defeat the Government in 1941, money was withdrawn from the Society's bank account and believed to have been placed to the credit of individual members, no doubt in trust for the Society, and it is possible that they have secret methods of protecting their property. As beneficiaries in wills, the Society acquires property and money.

40. In 1953, 114 Jehovah's Witness delegates left Australia by air to attend the July Convention in New York; with the exception of four, all paid their own fares which involved an expenditure of over £72,000.

"Jehovah's Witnesses had never been against the War effort. The majority of them were engaged in production helpful to the nation's effort. Because they could not swear allegiance to any individual kingdom but only to the Kingdom of Christ, did not mean that they did not believe earnestly in the cause of freedom."

(Sydney Morning Herald 15.6.1943)

43. This attitude has now resulted in a number of youths, members of this Society, claiming exemption from national training.

 NOTE - (This number may be understated because it is only recently that the Department of Labour and National Service have made efforts to ascertain the religious beliefs of any person raising an objection on conscientious grounds. This may apply to all States)

New South Wales.

No total figures available but in 1953 applications were received from persons describing them as ministers of Jehovah's Witnesses by Magistrates of Petty Sessions at Sydney, Griffith, Broken Hill, Wollongong, Orange, Goulburn, Glen Innes, Newcastle, Maitland, Singleton, Murwillumbah, Grafton, Coffs Harbour and Albury.

Propaganda.

44. As far as can be ascertained there has been no systematic canvassing of National Service trainees.

INFLUENCE AMONG NEW AUSTRALIANS.

45. No details of membership of New Australians have been obtained but there would appear to be no doubt that they have New Australian groups meeting in this country. At the Melbourne Convention last year foreign language groups held special meetings. Assemblies of Greek, German, Dutch,



MR. AND MRS. C. S. GOODMAN AND MRS. L. M.
AND MISS M. M. HARDING

Application has been made by the abovenamed to secure permission to enter the Commonwealth from India.

The applicants are all members of the Jehovah's Witness Sect and Mr. Goodman is employed full-time by the Society as the Secretary for their Pakistan branch. He has indicated that he will continue to be employed by the society, should he be admitted to the Commonwealth.

There seems to be little doubt that Mr. Goodman is completely European in descent. However, the three remaining applicants were born in India, and the family has lived in India for at least three generations and although they claim to be predominantly European in descent they cannot produce any documentary evidence to support their statement. The Hardings although they do not possess complete documentary evidence are considered to be eligible for admission to Australia by the Australian Government Trade Commission's Office, Bombay.

The present instruction regarding the admission of aliens who belong to the Society stipulates that applications lodged overseas by members of this sect should not be approved. However, no rule has been laid down regarding the question of the admission of members of the Sect who are British Subjects.

Submitted as to whether:-

- (1) Membership of Sect is sufficient to warrant rejection of applicants; or
- (2) We should insist on the production of documentary evidence that the Hardings are of European descent, (their rejection would probably keep Goodman in India). Or
- (3) They may be permitted to enter the Commonwealth subject to the usual conditions of health, character, etc.

MR. BROWN'S REMARKS.

In so far as British subjects are concerned I don't think we should refuse admission because they belong to a religious sect that is not looked upon with favour. It is policy not to prevent the entry of British Communists. Recommended that applicants be admitted provided they comply with normal requirements.

Reference is made to the attached memorandum in which it was decided, in July, 1954, that, where an application for a visitors visa revealed that the applicant was engaged either in a missionary and/or executive capacity in the Jehovah's Witness organisation, or desired to enter Australia to work with the organisation here, the grant of a visa should be withheld pending reference to A.S.I.O.

Has not been included. // No advice of the decision was sent to overseas posts but it was referred for inclusion in the instruction manual.

The Australian Consulate-General, New York, has now advised that visitors visas were granted in January, 1956, to two members of the Jehovah's Witness Sect., Nathan Homer Knorr, President of the Society, and Don Alden Adams, missionary and executive of the Society.

The Consul-General states that difficulty is being encountered in dealing with applications for visitors visas made by members of the Society as they hold no information on procedure to be adopted.

On 29th May, 1952, overseas posts were advised by circular memorandum that the following procedure should be adopted when dealing with the question of the admission into Australia of Jehovah's Witnesses:-

- "(1) applications on Form 47 by members of the sect should not be approved;
- (2) where landing permits are issued to members of the sect who are sponsored by residents of Australia the activities of the grantees should be closely investigated and a report furnished to this office before visas are granted."

The present Handbook of instruction to overseas representatives contains the following instruction regarding Jehovah's Witnesses:-

- "(1) applications lodged overseas by members of this sect should not be approved;
- (2) where forms 40 received from Australia relate to the entry of nominees who are known, or found to be members of this sect, visa facilities should not be granted without reference to this Department."

Jehovah's Witnesses - visitors

1. In 1952, the Minister directed that application by aliens for migrant visas, who have been sponsored by residents of Australia, and who were Jehovah's Witnesses were to be referred to Central Office and unsponsored migrants were to be refused visas.

2. The question now arises as to whether Jehovah's Witnesses are to be admitted into Australia as visitors, subject to the usual conditions or whether each case is to be referred to Central Office for decision.

3. In a recent case in which a Jehovah's Witness wished to enter Australia for 12 months to restore his health after being in the tropics, approval was given for his temporary admission. A.S.I.O. who were consulted on the matter advised that they had no objection to entry for a limited period but that any question of allowing him to remain permanently should be viewed in a different light.

4. It has been the experience of the Department that many visitors often seek to extend their stay here and even remain permanently. The admission of Jehovah's Witnesses as visitors could therefore prove a source of embarrassment and it appears that the Department should exercise close supervision over any applications by them to visit Australia.

5. It is recommended that all applications to visit Australia by Jehovah's Witnesses be referred to Central Office for consideration in conjunction with the views of A.S.I.O. in each individual case.

Forms of application for the grant of visas do not contain any reference to religion and consequently it is impracticable to detect whether the applicant is a Jehovah's Witness. Visas are granted by British visa issuing authorities overseas without reference to the Department and it could not be expected that British authorities would go outside normal procedure to question persons regarding religion. Charges of discrimination would arise if genuine tourist and business men were refused visas solely because of their religious beliefs.

We have received applications for short term
visas, for a ten day visit to Sydney by Mr. Nathan Homer Knorr and
Mr. Don Alden Adams, who hold United States passports numbers
734593 and 565416 respectively.

Both are members of the International Bible
Students Association and Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society
(Jehovah's Witnesses).

A letter covering application for visa, from
Mr. W.L.Thornton, Foreign Service Secretary of the Society, of
the 26th December 1955, guarantees the maintenance of Mr. Adams
during the time he is abroad and sets out that he will be dealing
with the educational program of the Society and speaking to local
congregations, as a minister of religion.

A letter of the 22nd December 1955, from Mr.
Knorr himself, gives his office as "President of the Watch Tower
Bible and Tract Society." He states that he is due to leave for
the South Pacific area to make his annual visit to branch offices,
on the 25th February, 1956. During this trip he proposes a ten
day visit to Australia. His purpose there will be to check the
local office especially on its educational program and to speak to
local congregations, as a minister of religion. His visit will
be entirely non-commercial and non-political. He also states that
the Society will, similarly, guarantee his maintenance.

Mr. Knorr has already visited Australia in
1946 and 1951.

We are encountering considerable difficulties
in dealing with applications by members of this Society. The
instructions by the Department of Immigration of the 29th May, 1952
and Part 3 "General Information concerning admission for Residence"
Paragraph 19(b) cover the subject of permanent entry under Form
47 and Form 40. No information is held, however, on the subject
of shorter visits and the Department has not yet answered our
memorandum No. Imm. 99/54 of the 17th May 1954. This letter was
written during an exchange of correspondence on a proposed visit
of James D. Chambliss (Department of Immigration File 13/2049).

It will be seen that that memorandum raised
the question of shorter visits and asked for a ruling on the
subject. We should be grateful to receive a reply on the question
generally in response to this memorandum.

Please see the attached memorandum from Cologne in which it will be noted that the nominees, the mother, brother and wife of the sponsor, are Jehovah's Witnesses.

In March, 1952 the Minister directed that cases such as this should be submitted as to whether the nominees were to be granted visas.

Jehovah's Witnesses are not well regarded because of its attitude during the last war. It is not however an unlawful organisation.

It is suggested that in view of the close relationship involved in this case, the fact that those concerned are Jehovah's Witnesses is not sufficient reason to refuse the nominees visas.

Submitted. Office reports that the results of his check reveals no adverse information on Ingberg and his wife members of the Sect, Jehovah's Witnesses.

Mr. Max Suprecht Ingberg, the sponsor of this family, also has a wife, Ingberg, who is presumably still married to Suprecht. The name of Ludwig Rosenthal is also mentioned in this file as the wife accepted under cover of my name on 26th September 1952.

Wolfgang and his family, and his mother Trix have all been passed as medically fit by the Senior Medical Officer, Cologne.

The Security Officer reports that the results of his checks reveals no adverse information on Wolfgang and Trix except membership of the Sect, Jehovah's Witnesses.

Mr. Max Rupprecht Pallavicini, the sponsor of this family, also has a wife, Ingeborg, who is presumably still resident in Germany. She was the grantee of Landing Permit C. 94863 which was returned to your office for cancellation under cover of my memo 5391 dated 8th September 1951 as she had been accepted under the Mass D P Scheme.

Between September 1951 and June 1952 Frau Ingeborg was listed to sail for Australia on three successive ships, but she failed to report to the Embarkation Centre, her excuses ranging from being sick to having a misunderstanding with her husband.

Subsequently Landing Permit C. 173533 which was issued in her favour and transmitted per her husband was received in this office under cover of Schedule 125, Head Office No. 6319. This permit was issued by the Department of Immigration, Sydney, on 29th August 1952, file No. 52/22/62381.

No further word has been received by this office from Frau Ingeborg despite our efforts to contact her.

When the sponsor, Max Rupprecht, was issued with a visa on 11th June 1951, nothing was known of his membership with the Jehovah's Witnesses.

The members of this family are very presentable people and acceptable in all respects except for their religion.

In view of the above information and with particular reference to the religious sect to which they belong would you please advise whether visas should be granted to Trix Pallavicini (Landing Permit C. 169403), Wolfgang and family (Form 40, Group No. 156, Serial No. V 1076) and Ingeborg (Landing Permit C.173533) - to the latter if and when she subsequently lodges her application.

Landing Permit C. 169403 was issued in favour of Trix Pallavicini by the Department of Immigration, Melbourne, on 18th September 1952, file No. 52/34/679. The permit was transmitted per Mr. Max Rupprecht Pallavicini, 166 Queensberry St., North Melbourne, Victoria, who is subject's son.

Mrs. Pallavicini was interviewed in this office.

Her father was a Jew but her mother was a Christian. She claims to have been brought up in the Evangelical faith, which was also the religion of her husband. She claims that her two sons were also members of that faith. Her documents show that she was baptised and married in Evangelical churches.

Form 40, Group No. 156, Serial No. V 1076, file No. 52/34/679 issued in favour of Wolfgang Pallavicini is held in this office.

Subject was also sponsored by Mr. Max Rupprecht his brother, whose address in this case is given as 50 Ethel Street, Thornbury, Melbourne, Victoria.

This applicant was first interviewed in this office in January last as he had applied under the German Assisted Passages scheme for acceptance as a welder. He was however rejected for technical and selection reasons. The selection reasons were based on the grounds that he was a Jehovah's Witness.

On receipt of the above quoted Form 40 subject was again called into this office for an interview on 27th March 1953 and thoroughly interrogated.

The Interviewing and Selection Officer comments as follows:-

" This applicant supports his application with numerous certificates and references. He was very frank and straightforward during the interview and made no hesitation when questioned regarding his religion.

In this connection he and his family were Evangelists until 1947 when they became Jehovah's Witnesses. He states that he changed because he believes he is now practising a better form of religion. His brother in Australia, his mother (grantee of Landing Permit C. 169403) and his wife all belong to this Sect. He seemed to be quite enthusiastic about it.

Disregarding his religion subject impressed as being quite a presentable type. He was clean, well dressed and to all outward appearances, acceptable.

His only relative in Australia is his brother and sponsor. He stated that all members of his family were prepared to migrate there about 1939 but the war prevented it. He is not contented with general living conditions in Germany and believes that he could benefit himself by migrating.

Application has been received for permission for Donald Burkhardt, a United States national residing in Thailand to visit Australia for twelve months.

2. Burkhardt is a member of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society commonly known as Jehovah's Witnesses. This body is not favourably regarded because of its anti-Australian and anti-British attitude during the war, but it is not an unlawful organisation. In 1952, it was directed that applications for admission by unnominated members of the organisation should be rejected but that persons sponsored by residents of Australia should be considered on their merits.

3. Burkhardt's application is supported by the Australian Branch of the Society which will be responsible for him and under whose supervision he will work.

4. A.S.I.O. whose views were sought offers no objection to Burkhardt's entry for a limited period but considers that the question of allowing him to remain permanently should be viewed in a different light. In this connection the Director-General, A.S.I.O. stated that he was strongly opposed to any extension of nominations to include the Australian Branch of Jehovah's Witnesses as this could nullify the protection given by the present policy.

5. It is not considered that there is any great objection to allowing Burkhardt to come here for twelve months and it is recommended that his admission be approved for that period on the understanding that no extension of his stay will be sought.

To defeat the Government in 1941, money was withdrawn from the Society's bank account and believed to have been placed to the credit of individual members, no doubt in trust for the Society, and it is possible that they have secret methods of protecting their property. As beneficiaries in wills, the Society acquires property and money.

In 1953, 114 Jehovah's Witness delegates left Australia by air to attend the July Convention in New York; with the exception of four, all paid their own fares which involved an expenditure of over £72,000.

Military Service.

Jehovah's Witnesses claim exemption from military service. They state that they are not pacifists but fight only when God commands them to do so. They claim exemption on the grounds that as ministers of religion they should be exempted from service.

A statement made by their attorney in Australasia reads -

"Jehovah's Witnesses had never been against the War effort. The majority of them were engaged in production helpful to the nation's effort. Because they could not swear allegiance to any individual kingdom but only to the Kingdom of Christ, did not mean that they did not believe earnestly in the cause of freedom."

(Sydney Morning Herald 15/6/1943)

This attitude has now resulted in a number of youths, members of this Society, claiming exemption from national training. Figures which have been furnished showing the number of youths who have claimed exemption from national training because they are members of the Society are -

These figures are believed to be underestimated because the Department of Labour and National Service has only recently started to ascertain the religious beliefs of applicants for exemption. In N.S.W. applications were received by Magistrates in 13 country towns and Sydney.

General.

C.I.S. state that as far as can be ascertained there has been no systematic canvassing of National Service trainees. Details of membership of New Australians are not available but it appears that they do have meetings. At the Melbourne Convention last year foreign language groups had special meetings in Greek, German, Dutch, Polish and Italian. The leader of the Australian Branch of the Society is Theodore Jaracz, a U.S.A. citizen of Polish nationality who was admitted as a business visitor in February, 1951 and again in September, 1953.

Legality.

No change in the lawfulness of the organization has occurred since Mr. Justice Williams said - "The religion of Jehovah's Witnesses is a Christian religion" and Mr. Justice Stark held that "the association of persons known as Jehovah's Witnesses are not engaged in any seditious enterprise nor in the printing or publishing of any seditious words within the meaning of the Crimes Act 1914-1932".

Membership.

During a Convention held in Melbourne in 1935 it was claimed that membership in Australia exceeded 7000. At a Convention in Melbourne in 1953 attendance was approximately 1500 at most sessions, culminating with a final Sunday session of about 6000. (It appeared however that many of those present were not members of the Society but simply pleasure seekers taking advantage of a Sunday afternoon's entertainment).

Property.

Headquarters of the Australian Branch is in Sydney and each State headquarters is in the capital city. It appears that the Society owns the headquarters buildings and one or two other properties nominally owned by its adherents.

Finance.

Little information is available on the present financial status of the Society. It appears that possibly the only sources of income are voluntary contributions and the sale of literature. The Society does not appear poverty stricken as no expense was spared at the Convention last year, hiring of the Exhibition Building alone being £45 a day.

Some idea of its financial standing may be obtained from the fact that from June 1948 to May 1951, the publications "Watch Tower" and "Awake" were admitted duty free and totalled 779,364 and 936,360 copies respectively. These are sold by house to house canvas at 4/- a copy. (Maximum sale value £343,145). The books are sent to Australia from the U.S.A. Society as a gift.

In September, 1952 an import licence was granted valued at £3006 for the introduction of 94,460 other books of which 100 were in Arabic, 100 in French, 500 in Dutch and 3640 in German.

In 1941, Jehovah's Witnesses in Australia were openly engaged in commerce and trade. Their operations included sawmills, farming, engineering, printing, investment in New Zealand flax, tin and gems. All the commercial ventures were later sold, and it is suspected, to members of the Society, and it is likely that they are merely held in trust.

8 In March, 1952, the Minister directed that applications on Form 47 by members of the Society for entry into Australia should be rejected and members sponsored by residents of Australia should be investigated and a report furnished before visas are granted.

8 A U.S.A. Citizen, Donald Burkhart, a Jehovah's Witness, residing in Thailand, has applied to visit Australia for a period of 12 months for "a change of climate". The application is supported by the Australian Branch of the Society which it was said would be responsible for him and under whose supervision he would work.

8 The Australian Security Intelligence Organization was asked to advise -

- (a) whether there was any security objection to the application;
- (b) whether it was considered that the policy applying to Form 47 applications should be extended to persons who are nominated by the Society here and who would be engaged in furthering its activities here.

A.S.I.O. stated that:-

- (a) they do not see any security objection to Burkhart's entry for a limited period but consider that any application by him to remain for permanent residence could well be viewed in a different light;

and in regard to (b) the Director-General stated -

8 "I am strongly opposed to any extension of nominations to include the Australian Branch of Jehovah's Witnesses as this could at once result in the nomination of any member of this Sect and could nullify the protection given by the present policy." X

8 The reasoning advanced by A.S.I.O. on the whole question appears confusing. It will be seen that they strongly support the policy approved by the Minister and yet on the other hand they have no objection to one of the society's adherents being admitted for a period of twelve months to further its interests. It could well be argued that if the activities of the society are so objectionable, then even the temporary admission of one of its members should be refused.

8 The Commonwealth Investigation Service was asked to furnish an up-to-date report on the Society and they have advised that although the matter was one of a question of subversive activity and should rightly be dealt with by A.S.I.O., they would with the approval of Director-General of Security furnish the desired report. The Director General approved.

9 The report has now been furnished and is of seven pages. This has been condensed as much as possible as follows:-

The Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society

1 The members of the Society are commonly known as Jehovah's Witnesses. Its activities are well known mainly because of the anti-Australian and anti-British attitude it adopted during the war when they stated they would not fight for Australia, even if it was invaded, and did not recognize the King.

2 In 1938 the Commonwealth Investigation Service advised that official and other whole time workers of the society do not receive actual wages but are wholly maintained and given any necessary out of pocket expenses. Publications setting out the tenets of the society are often hawked from door to door. ~~the founder of the society.~~

3 In 1942 the Commonwealth Investigation Service furnished a report on the Society and the salient points are -

Objectives. (1) To preach the doctrines of Jehovah God.

(2) The organisation uses religion as a cover for its commercial activities, and full time adherents receive little or no remuneration for their services in business undertakings controlled by the Sect.

Activities. Canvassing their doctrines to individual house-holders and (during the recent war) to further their mission which then appeared to include pacifism and defeatism.

The organisation caused great discontent among the general public during the war as members of the sect would not allow their sons to join the fighting services, openly stated they would not fight for the protection of Australia, if invaded and did not recognize the King of England. Parents who are members of the sect will not allow their children to salute the Union Jack or sing the National Anthem. The organisation is opposed to all organized religion.

Finance. The organisation raises funds by donations, subscription, sale of literature but at the time of the report principal income was derived from many business undertakings comprising Canteen and farm adjoining Ingleburn Military Camp, laundry adjacent to Camp, farms, sawmills, second hand yard, printeries, engineering work and large amount of real estate. The operations of the business undertakings were hidden under the name of various Companies formed by the International Bible Students Association.

The reporting officers are satisfied that the sect owns and controls the business undertakings in the names of their trusted members.

Prior to its being declared unlawful the sect's banking account at Strathfield showed an annual turn-over of £30,000 - £40,000.

WHAT IS A JEHOVAH'S WITNESS?

By *Milton
G. Henschel

What is the basic creed professed by Jehovah's Witnesses?

The Witnesses have no creed. They follow the Bible all the way, not half way. They feel the Bible is entirely consistent — both the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures — and practical for our day.

Where did the name come from?

The name Jehovah's Witnesses is found in the Bible in Isaiah 43:12: "Ye are my witnesses, saith Jehovah, and I am God." A history of Jehovah's Witnesses and their service to God takes us back 6000 years. Abel and other men of faith before Christ are called "witnesses" in Hebrews 11 and 12:1. Christ is "the faithful and true witness" in Revelation 3:14. He designated others to continue the testimony, saying, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me . . . unto the uttermost part of the earth" — Acts 1:8.

Jehovah's Witnesses today are merely the last of a long line of servants of God. They are not an incorporated body. They use the non-profit Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, which was incorporated in Pennsylvania by Charles Taze Russell and associate Christians in 1884, as the governing body.

What are the teachings of Jehovah's Witnesses?

That Jehovah is the only true God. His supremacy has been challenged by Satan, who caused

Jehovah's Witnesses believe Christ took power in heaven in 1914 and they look forward to the battle of Armageddon when evil will be destroyed

the rebellion in Eden and who puts the integrity of all men to the test. God's primary purpose is the vindication of this supremacy. In carrying out this purpose, God sent Jesus to earth to provide the ransom sacrifice and to lay the foundation for God's new system.

Jehovah will not tolerate wickedness on earth forever. The beginning of the end for Satan came when Christ took power in heaven as King. This happened in 1914. Christ's first act was casting Satan out of heaven, and this was followed by great troubles on earth.

This will be climaxed in God's battle, Armageddon: the complete destruction of the Devil and his system of things, his world. This is the vindication of Jehovah's name and the beginning of the 1000-year reign of Christ. Then all will praise Jehovah.

Christ is now in his second presence. He will always remain invisible to humans, but his presence is proved by world events since 1914, which fulfil all the predictions of Matthew 24.

Now the Christian's duty is to keep integrity to Jehovah, to announce the King's reign and to help neighbors find the way to

godly service and everlasting life.

Do Witnesses salute the flag?

Saluting a flag, of any nation, is regarded by Jehovah's Witnesses as un-Christian image worship. Any national flag is a symbol of sovereign power, regarded by people as sacred.

Jehovah's Witnesses cannot conscientiously participate in an act that ascribes salvation to the national emblem and to the nation for which it stands, for, in the Ten Commandments, it says, "Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them."

Jehovah's Witnesses do not wish to incur the wrath of God by acts of worship contrary to His Commands. They do not oppose anyone's desire or right to salute the flag. Each must decide for himself what he will do. That is true freedom of worship.

Do Witnesses deny governmental authority?

No. Without governments,

anarchy and chaos would Earthly governments have the right to make laws to regulate morals, protect persons and property and maintain public order.

Jehovah's Witnesses obey all such laws, if they are in accord with God's laws. When there is direct conflict between God's law and that of a government, they obey the supreme law of God as set forth in the Bible.

Why do Witnesses claim exemption from military service?

Because they have conscientious objections, based on the commandments of God, against taking part in the world's wars. Wars between nations today are not the same as Israel's wars in ancient times. Israel was Jehovah's theocratic nation, and the Israelites were fighters in God's wars. No political nation today can properly claim that status.

Though not pacifists, Jehovah's Witnesses fight only when God commands them to do so. Since the days of ancient Israel, God has not commanded men to fight in wars between nations.

That is why Christians of the first century refused to serve in the imperial armies of Rome. Besides, ministers of religion are exempted from military service by law in many countries. Because

the vocation of each Jehovah's Witness is the ministry, all Witnesses claim exemption under such laws.

They do not oppose the desire of any person to serve in the armed forces of any nation. Nor do they oppose the efforts of any nation to raise an army by conscripting its manpower. They merely keep their own neutrality, refusing to break their allegiance to their God and Saviour. Their position is that of neutral ambassadors for Christ the King.

Having a good conscience toward God does not make a person a weakling or a coward. Fear of death does not cause the Witnesses to take this position; in some lands, they are executed by firing squads because of it. It takes more courage to stand up for unpopular principles than it does to go along with the majority.

What do Witnesses believe about hell?

Hell is the grave; it is not a place of fiery, eternal torment. Hell is a place of rest, in hope of resurrection, not a place of torture from which one can never escape. Peter said Jesus was in hell after his death.

Death and hell will both be destroyed at the end of the 1000-year rule of Christ. Purgatory is not mentioned once in the Bible. It is an invention of men. There is no "intermediate" state of the dead. Such ideas are found in the ancient pagan religions, not

Do Witnesses believe in heaven?

Heaven is the habitation of the creatures; it is God's throne. The reward of spiritual life in heaven for men on earth is limited to those who inherit the kingdom of God. In Revelation 7:4, the number of these is given as exactly 144,000.

What will become of the billions of people who have lived on the earth?

After mentioning the 144,000 who will go to heaven, Revelation 7 tells of "a great multitude, which no man could number, of all nations", standing before the

throne. These are destined to live forever on the earth.

The apostle Peter said, "We, according to His promise, look for new heavens and a new earth." This means the removal of the wicked and oppressive system under Satan and the ushering in of the righteous rule of Christ.

Then the earth will be made a paradise. "There shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain"—Revelation 21:4. Jehovah will provide all things needed by the human family, and animals now ferocious will be at peace with man—Isaiah 65.

There will be no more national boundaries, no political divisions and no war—Micah 4. It is to such a world that those in the graves will be resurrected.

Do Witnesses believe in baptism?

Yes. Baptism is a symbol of dedication to the will of Jehovah. We consider baptism to be complete submersion, not just sprinkling.

The baptism that started with Jesus is not meant for cleansing from sin, because Jesus was no sinner—Hebrews 7. Matthew 28 shows that the baptised ones must first be taught. This, with Jesus' baptism at the age of 30, shows that baptism is not for infants but for persons of responsible age who have the ability to learn.

Can any Witness be an ordained minister?

Yes, for true ordination comes from God. Jehovah, through Christ, ordains his witnesses to serve as ministers—John 15:16. Jesus chose fishermen, tax collectors and other untrained men, as well as the learned Paul.

Similar men may become ordained ministers today. Jehovah's Witnesses are, indeed, a society or body of ministers.

The public ceremony of water immersion identifies one as a minister of God. It marks him as a person who has dedicated his entire life to the service of Jehovah; it implies acceptance of the obligations which the ministry imposes.

Jesus set the example by his baptism in the River Jordan, after which he devoted his life to the ministry. We believe that titles like "Reverend" and "Father" are not properly applied to ministers but belong to God alone—Matthew 23:9. Clerical garb is never used.

Are boys and girls allowed to preach?

Yes. Youths are not only permitted to preach, but they are invited to do so—just as the boys Samuel, Jeremiah and Timothy did. Jesus was only 12 when he was about his "Father's business", discussing the Scriptures.

Are ministers and workers paid?

Ministers at our national headquarters in Brooklyn, NY, and in the field are voluntary workers. All officers of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society and others at headquarters receive 12 dollars allowance per month for personal needs. They are given free room and board. As a means of support, most of the Witnesses do secular work.

How are Jehovah's Witnesses governed?

The governing body at present has 402 members, who reside in 29 countries and elect seven ministers as a board of directors; the board chooses one director as president. The present president is N. H. Knorr, of Brooklyn.

What is the attitude toward divorce?

Divorces may be obtained only on the ground of marital unfaithfulness. Adultery is a violation of God's law. If a Witness obtains a divorce on other grounds and remarries, he must be expelled from the congregation.

What is the attitude toward birth control?

The purpose of marriage is the rearing of children. Jehovah's Witnesses regard birth control as an entirely personal matter.

Why do they refuse blood transfusions?

Leviticus 17:10 says, "Whatsoever man . . . eateth any manner

Why are Witnesses persecuted?

The Bible says, "All that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall



Following on my telephone conversation with you, I want to confirm in writing what I told you then, that I do not believe that Jehovah's Witnesses are anti-British.

I have seen British official White Papers which show that these people suffered very cruelly at the hands of the Nazis - worse, I think, than the Jews did.

I have acted for them for years and I never saw, nor was I told of, anything disloyal which they did.

They are much misunderstood - and a lot of that is due to the stupidity of some of their adherents.

Their idea is that Jehovah intended the world to be perfect. The devil butted in and man became very imperfect. Because of the devil there are nations, illness, death, money &c. &c. They are all inconsistent with a perfect world and, therefore, all of them (however meritorious otherwise - even Britain) are the works of the devil.

They accept the old millenariast doctrine that the Kingdom of Christ is about to return to earth and that return has commenced. When that is complete, there will not be any more deaths, nations or money. (I found it easy to take my fees from them!) The continued existence of any one nation, therefore, is inconsistent with the return of Christ's Kingdom. They, therefore, cannot pray for the success of any nation, however good, or for any King, however splendid. Because they cannot pray for the King, some of their followers used to think that they must damn him! That has been cured.

Evidence was given and they were cross-examined before Starke J. in their High Court action and he found as a fact - which no one now disputes - that, as the Theocracy "they have no part in the political affairs of the world and must not interfere in the least manner with war between nations. They must be entirely neutral they are

not engaged in any seditious enterprise nor in the printing or publishing of any seditious words". I have taken those words in quotes from Jehovah's Witnesses v. The Commonwealth 67 Commonwealth L.R. 116 which you could read with advantage.

They played ball with Brigadier Simpson as Director of Security. He actually gave them references to the Town Clerk of Sydney as a result of which they had the Sydney Town Hall. Bill Furnell - if you give him a ring - will tell you how splendidly they co-operated with manpower.

At one time, they were aggressive, but they are now "apt to teach humbly".

As a practising R.C., I have no axe to grind for these people, but my sense of fair play does impel me to write this letter to you so that you will, at least, keep an open mind as regards their loyalty.

I could give you a lot more than the above, including my own evidence on oath before the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Broadcasting as to the agreement I had with Navy to put these people back on the air, but they were invalidly declared to be abolished before the arrangements were carried out. But I shall not weary you.

A U.S.A. Citizen, Donald Burkhart, a Jehovah's Witness, residing in Thailand, recently applied to visit Australia for a period of 12 months for "a change of climate". The application was supported by the Australian Branch of the Society which it was said would be responsible for him and under whose supervision he would work.

The Australian Security Intelligence Organization was asked to advise -

- (a) whether there was any security objection to the application;
- (b) whether it was considered that the policy applying to Form 47 applications should be extended to persons who are nominated by the Society here and who would be engaged in furthering its activities here.

A.S.I.O. stated that:-

- (a) they do not see any security objection to Burkhart's entry for a limited period but consider that any application by him to remain for permanent residence could well be viewed in a different light;

and in regard to (b) the Director-General stated -

XX

"I am strongly opposed to any extension of nominations to include the Australian Branch of Jehovah's Witnesses as this could at once result in the nomination of any member of this Sect and could nullify the protection given by the present policy." XX

The reasoning advanced by A.S.I.O. on the whole question appears confusing. It will be seen that they strongly support the policy approved by the Minister and yet on the other hand they have no objection to one of the society's adherents being admitted for a period of twelve months to further its interests. It could well be argued that if the activities of the society are so objectionable, and on this point there seems no doubt, then even the temporary admission of one of its members should be refused.

The numerical strength in Australia of the society is unknown but it appears highly undesirable that it should be increased even temporarily in view of its past record, particularly its anti-patriotic outlook and activities during war when it was essential that the country present a united front.

It seems to me that the activities of the organisation to which the man belongs are so objectionable that ^{18th June, 1953.} Dr. Foster he should not be admitted for permanent residence, there are strong grounds for refusing him admission for a period of twelve months. It can be argued on such activities on the other hand if there is no objection to him engaging in such activities for twelve months why should there be objection to him continuing to engage in those activities for a further period. If the policy approved by the Minister is not to be varied this is the only logical course which to refuse admission either permanently or temporarily.







Dear Department,

The Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society has written to us requesting visas for the President of the Society, Mr. W. H. Knorr and his Secretary, Mr. M. G. Henschel, who are preparing to make a round-the-world trip on business for the Society. When we referred these applications to the British Passport Control Office for security clearance, we received the cards back together with the following note:-

Advice has already been sent. See letter of 6th January 1947.

"There is nothing against either applicant but the activities of the Society are apt to be difficult and to stir up trouble with other religious factions. They have been granted visas for the United Kingdom on one or two occasions, but in any application of a member of this Society we always follow the procedure of referring the application to the Government of the territory concerned in order that their entry may be decided upon by persons qualified to judge by the previous performance of the Society in that particular territory."

In view of this we felt that the applications ought to be referred to you for decision.

As Mr. Knorr and Mr. Henschel plan to leave New York sometime in February, I should appreciate an early reply to this letter.







We desire to bring to our Headquarters here two Ministers who have graduated from The Watch Tower Bible College of Gilead (South Lansing, N. Y.) and would be glad if the Department would approve of landing permits being issued to these two men. Their personal details are as follows:

FLOYD FRANKLIN GARRETT, a native-born citizen of the United States of America, born on July 8, 1919, at Clarksville, Texas, and who is not married;

BENJAMIN BROCK MASON, a native-born citizen of the United States of America, born on February 17, 1917, at Naugatuck, Connecticut, and who is not married.

Both of these men are in possession of valid United States Passports for the journey to Australia, but will not be issued with visas until the Department has approved the issuance of their landing permits.

The Society is anxious to have these Ministers here in time to attend a Convention being held here in December and it would be greatly appreciated if you could cable the Australian Consulate in New York, at our expense, authorizing the issuing of landing permits.



The length of their stay in Australia is indefinite, but will be for not less than two years and during their stay, and without regard to its length, the Society guarantees to support, accommodate and in every other way provide for and maintain them.
